

Being in feeble health but of suprising mind and memory I make this my last Will and Testament. I leave to my beloved wife Susan B Taylor the farm on which I reside together with all my perishable estate Claims, Bonds &c (after paying all my just debts) during her natural life provided she never marries again, for the use and benefit of herself and such of my family as may need assistance. I do not wish any general sale of my property, but only such articles as may be spared for the payment of my debts viz. my young mule should it not be sold during my life. my Cattle that may be spared or Crops not necessary for the maintenance of my family. at the death of my wife, I wish my land and such of my perishable property as may remain to be sold and the money divided between my then surviving Children or heirs of their bodies, should my wife marry again then I wish my farm and such of my perishable property as may remain to be sold and the money divided between my then surviving Children or heirs of their body and my wife she taking a Child's portion, I wish my sister S. Catherine Taylor to have a home with my family so long as they remain together as a family on account of her destitute Condition unless she can otherwise better provide for herself. In the division of the money arising from the sale of my land and other property, I wish my son Zachary Taylor to have One hundred Dollars more than the other Children on account of his severe affliction should any security debt come against my estate, so as to render it necessary to sell any property to meet it, then I wish a part of that portion of my farm known as the Neck, say Twenty or Thirty Acres. adjoining the land of Mr Farthing Commencing a line at the Neck Crossing and running back to the Swamp—leaving from Evans' meadow to Piggott's Mill Pond so as to embrace the quantity of land above mentioned to be sold, provided it can be done without too great a sacrifice of its value. I think it would be best for my wife to qualify as administratrix of my estate.
