of said will in due form

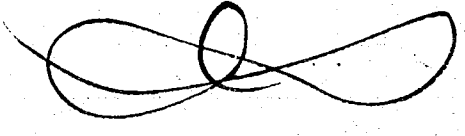

of King and Queen County Va. do make this my
last will and testament hereby revoking all other
wills - I give unto my dear Howard Council my
burned and bed, and large Camo Breast pin
but I wish my sister Priscy to keep the pin
until Howard arrives at a way, when as
thence Howard will take care of it -
I give unto my dear Nelly to Jones my hair
Bread pin and pair of Blankets, I give to
my dear Mary B. Council, my finest white
Camo and, and my dear Blanche Jones
my finest table cloth, I give unto my dear
Gertrude Council my little Camo pin
and to my dear Garkard, my gold button,
I give unto my dear Sally, Lelia and Evelyn
Smith, my evening apparel, to be divided
among them, as my sister Priscy may think
suitable, I give unto my dear Patsy Smith
the sum of five dollars, and to my nephew

George M. Council, the sum of one hundred
 dollars, to be paid to him, or some as he may
 direct after my death, all the balance of
 my estate both real and personal I
 give to my sister Priscy for and during
 her life, and the same at her death, to
 be divided equally among my remaining
 brothers and sisters. If any of my estate
 interested in keeping a suitable school
 around the Goshen gran yard should
 undertake to erect such school, I
 direct that fifty dollars be given out of
 my estate towards such object, and
 I direct that my body be interred in
 the grave of either of my father, mother
 or brother Beunty as may be thought
 suitable, I appoint my brothers in law
 J. Council and J. H. Jones my executors
 and direct that no security be required
 of them as such, by the Court, and I give
 them, with the consent of my sister Priscy
 to sell my farm containing William Cole
 Belmont, after fulfilling my little estate
 by paying the balance due thereon, and
 to sell therefrom first, if they shall see fit
 to do so, such timber of any character
 as they may think can be converted
 into money, without any hazard
 and seal this 24th day of August 1882
