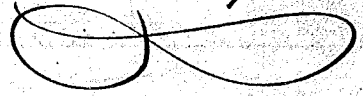

19th Sept. 1871. I, Roberta A. Burch of the County of King
 Queen and State of Virginia, do pronounce
 this to be my testament and last will, re-
 voking all other wills up to this date.

1st I wish the land that I got by my
 father's estate to be divided into two
 equal parts one half I lend to my
 husband James M. Burch during his
 natural life, and at his death I give
 the said interest to my son James L.
 Philips, and his heirs forever.

2^d: The other half I give to my son
 James L. Philips and to his heirs
 forever.

3rd: I appoint my son James L.
 Philips my Executor to carry out
 the provisions of the above will
 without security.

In the name of God amen. I, Richard Gresham of King & Queen County and State of Virginia, do make this my last will and testament as follows, to wit:

I wish all my just debts first to be paid, and after my debts are paid, it is my wish, that is to say I leave to my wife Kitty, all my property which I may live at my death, both real and personal during her widowhood, but if she should marry then I direct she shall take her thirds, and at my wife's death I give said property to my three Boys Richard, William & James equally to be divided between said Boys, Richard, William & James.

It is my wish that my daughter Margaret and my grand son, by my son Albert, shall each receive at my wife's death one dollar of my estate and no more. Given under my hand and seal this 14th day of November 1868.
