I give to my son in Law William W. Woolfolk entire  
myself for the sole benefit use and enjoyment of my  
daughter Ann H. Woolfolk all my house hold and kitchen  
furniture of every description the said property is not to be subject  
to or in any way liable for the debt of the said William W. Woolfolk  
here before or here after contracted and the same property at the death of  
my daughter shall she die without issue or should she die before  
she attain her full age, to be equally divided between my  
surviving children or their descendants but should she die with  
issue but before such issue shall attain her full age then the  
property is to be continued to be held as aforesaid until  
such time to be equally divided between or among the surviving  
issue of issue. I hereby direct my executors to collect of James  
H. Marrow and son of Aly Dudley a debt of one hundred  
(and fifty dollars due me) to meet the said property in such  
a manner for the use of my daughter Ann H. Woolfolk as she may  
desire, the articles so purchased to be sold by the said William W.  
Woolfolk subject to the same restrictions and conditions as the  
property herefore bequeathed I constitute and appoint  
my son Robert T. Turner to execute of this my last will  
and Testament. Given under my hand and seal this

Office of said County by the fire in January, destroying  
also the names of the parties affected by said will and  
requesting that the undersigned would proceed at once  
and a place as he should appoint to take proof of  
the said will and the contents thereof after reasonable  
notice to the said parties and having given such reasonable  
notice to the said parties & proceed at December  
in King and Queen County the 22nd day of Oct 1870  
in accordance with said parties having first appointed  
John D. Graham who was present Guarded and observed  
before the testators of the infants Maria P. Wright  
and Robert P. Wright who are interested in the  
said will to take proof of the said will and also

contains thereof as follows to wit.

Mrs Catherine Wright a witness produced before me by the said Carlton and wife, being first duly sworn deponeth and saith as follows by way of Question and answer.

Question. Do you know whether Mrs Catherine Wright left a Will, if so, State, if you know, what were the contents of the said Will?

Answer. She left a will which was written by me and which with the exception of the caption was in the following words "I give and bequeath unto my daughter Virginia Wright all I may possess of the helpment of my just debts to be disposed of at her death as she may think proper."

Question. Was the Will so writing and signed by the said Catherine Wright? Answer. It was in writing and signed by the said Catherine Wright.

Question. Was the said Will acknowledged by the said Catherine Wright in your presence.

Answer. She requested me to witness her Will which I did in her presence & then read it to her and she signed it in my presence and in the presence of Miss Elizabeth Gorrie we being present together and in the presence of Mr Carlton and Carlton and there subscribed our names as witnesses to the said Will at the request of the said testatrix.

And further this deponent witnesseth.

Mrs Elizabeth Gorrie a witness produced before me by the said Carlton and wife being first duly sworn deponeth and saith as follows by way of question and answer.

Question. Do you know whether Mrs Catherine Wright left a Will, if so, State, if you know what were the contents of said Will?

Answer. She left a will, by which she gave all other property to her daughter Virginia Wright.

Question. When you present when the said Will was written? if you were, State of the circumstances attending the making and execution of the said Will.

Answer. I was not in the room when the Will was

written. After it was written I was sent for, came into the room, saw the testatrix sign the will and acknowledge it. Moore Wright and I being present together and record her & Mr. Moore Wright that she had too little to divide among them all and has therefore given all to her daughter Virginia Wright. Moore Wright and myself were then requested by the testatrix to subscribe to the will which we did in the presence of the said testatrix and in the presence of each other.

And further this deponent saith not.

Robert Boccard a attorney produced before me the said Carter and wife being first duly sworn dep<sup>t</sup> and saith as follows by way of question and answer.

Question. Are you the Clerk of the County Court of Kingman County? Answer. I am.

Question. State <sup>acc</sup> if you know who were present at the Will of Carterine Wright recorded.

Answer. On the 1<sup>st</sup> day of January 1864 the court of the said County was opened for proof in the County of this County and was presided by the Hon<sup>ble</sup> Elijah Jerrill one of the subscribing witness. Moore Wright mother of the testatrix being absent. After the sufficient as it is my duty to do the will and same was filed and the seal of the office of Clerk affixed after the payment of her debts to her daughter Virginia Wright the said will remained in the Clerk's office and was disregarded until the office was burned by the publican which took place before the proof of the said will was completed to wit on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of March 1864.

And further this deponent saith not.
