I Robert T. Turner of the County of King and Queen State
of Virginia do make and constitute this my last Will and Testament
I give to my son in Law William W. Woolfolk entire
nevertheless for the sole beneficial use and enjoyment of my
daughter Ann H. Woolfolk all my house hold and kitchen
furniture of every description the said property is not to be subject
to or in any way liable for the debt of the said William W. Woolfolk
heretofore or hereafter contracted and the said property at the death of
my daughter should she die without issue or should such issue
not attain lawful age to be equally divided between my
surviving children or their descendants but should she die with
issue but before such issue shall attain lawful age, then the
property is to be continued to be held as aforesaid until
such time to be equally divided between or given exclusively
to such issue. I hereby direct my executor to collect of Samuel
H. Woodward a sum of \$100.00 and of John H. Dudley a debt of one hundred
(and fifty dollars due me) and to invest the said money in such
wise as for the use of my daughter Ann H. Woolfolk as she may
desire the articles so purchased to be held by the said William W.
Woolfolk subject to the same restrictions and conditions as the
property heretofore bequeathed I constitute and appoint
my son Robert T. Turner the executor of this my last will
(and Testament) Given under my hand and seal this
the twenty fifth day of June 1870

of September 1870. This writing purporting to be the
 last will and Testament of Robert P. Turner deceased
 was offered for proof and there being no subscribing
 witnesses to the same William A. Saunders and
 A. Tyler were sworn and severally deposed that they
 were well acquainted with the Testator's hand and
 and verily believed that the said writing and memorandum
 subscribed to be wholly written by the Testator
 on hand. Whereupon the said writing is ordered
 to be recorded as the true last will and Testament
 of the said Robert P. Turner deceased.

Cornelius H. Corbin and America Corbin his wife
 having filed before the undersigned a Commission
 appointed by the Circuit Court of King and Queen
 their petition stating that the last will and Testament
 of Catherine Wright the late of the County of King and
 Queen was offered for probate and proved in
 the County Court of King and Queen on the 7th day of Jan
 1869, was destroyed in the late burning of the Clerk's
 office of said County by the public enemy, stating
 also the names of the parties affected by said will and
 asking that the undersigned would proceed as usual
 law and place as business appoint to take proof of
 the said will and the contents thereof, after reasonable
 notice to the said parties and having given such reasonable
 notice to the said parties & appeared at the session
 in King and Queen County, this 22nd day of Feb
 in accordance with said notice having first appointed
 John H. Graham who was present Guardian ad litem
 of the infants of the estate of the said Catherine Wright
 and Robert P. Wright who are interested in the
 said will to take proof of the said will and the

contents thereof as follows to wit.

Moore B. Wright a witness produced before me by the said Carlton and wife, being first duly sworn, deponeth and saith as follows by way of Question and answer.

Question. Do you know whether Mrs Catharine Wright left a Will, if so, state, if you know, what were the contents of the said Will? Answer. She left a will which

was written by me and which with the exception of the caption was in the following words "I give and bequeath unto my daughter Virginia B. Wright all I may possess after the payment of my just debts to be disposed of at her death as she may think proper."

Question. Was the ^{said} Will so writing and signed by the said Catharine Wright? Answer. It was in writing and signed by the said Catharine Wright.

Question. Was the said Will acknowledged by the said Catharine Wright in your presence?

Answer. She requested me to write her Will which I did in her presence and then read it to her and she signed it in my presence and in the presence of Miss Elizabeth Gornall we being present together and in the presence of the testatrix and we then had there subscribed our names as witnesses to the said Will at the request of the said testatrix.

And further this deponent with me

Moore B. Wright

Miss Elizabeth Gornall a witness produced before me by the said Carlton and wife being first duly sworn deponeth and saith as follows by way of question and answer.

Question. Do you know whether Mrs Catharine Wright left a Will, if so, state, if you know what were the contents of said Will? Answer. She left a will, by

which she gave all of her property to her daughter Virginia Wright. Question. Were you present when the said Will was written? if you were, state of the circumstances attending the making and signing of the said Will?

Answer. I was not in the room when the will was

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written. After it was written I was sent for, came in the room, saw the testator sign the will and acknowledge it to Moore Wright and I being present together and heard her say to Moore Wright that she had lost little to divide among them all and had therefore given all to her daughter Virginia Wright. Moore Wright and myself were then requested by the testator to subscribe the will as witnesses which we did in the presence of the said testator and in the presence of each other.

And further this deponent saith not.

Elizabeth Garrett

Robert Pollock a witness produced before me the said testator and wife being first duly sworn depose and say as follows by way of question and answer. Question. Are you the clerk of the County Court of King and Queen County? Answer. Yes.

Question. State ^{all} you know with reference to the will of Nathaniel Wright deceased?

Answer. On the 4th day of January 1864 the will of the said testator was offered for proof in the Court of this County and was proved by the oath of Elizabeth Garrett one of the subscribing witnesses. Moore Wright the other subscribing witness being absent. After the will of the said testator was read the will and a true and correct copy thereof was given to the wife of the testator after the payment of her debts to her daughter Virginia Wright. The said will remained in the Clerk's Office and was destroyed when the office was burned by the public enemy which took place upon the premises of the said Clerk on the 10th day of March 1864.

same before the same was lost. On consideration
whereof it is ordered that the said depositions be
regarded as the last will and testament of the said
Catherine Wright deceased.
