Sunstall being of sound and disposing mind and
memory, do make and ordain this to be my last will
and testament, hereby revoking all former wills made
by me

If any debt shall be outstanding at the time of
my death, against my estate, I direct that the same
shall be first paid by my Executors hereinafter named

I devise to my beloved wife, Jane F. Sunstall
the sum of ten thousand dollars - To my nephews,
Wiley C. Sunstall and James L. Sunstall, and to
my niece Eliza Virginia Inge, the children of my
deceased brother, James L. Sunstall of Alabama,
the sum of two thousand dollars each.

To my nephews George T. Tibbs and Robert T.
Tibbs, children of my sister Eliza, one thousand
dollars each, and to my niece Maria C. Tibbs, daugh-
ter of my said sister Eliza, the sum of two hundred
dollars - To Samuel Bland, the son of my friend
W. James E. Bland the sum of five thousand
dollars - To Lewis H. Sunstall, and Nannie Sunstall,
children of Richard G. Sunstall of Caroline County,
One thousand dollars each.

The funds out of which the foregoing devises

are to be paid consist of the bonds of several Rail Road Companies, and the corporation of the City of Richmond, the cash value of which varies in the market, but in order to simplify the payment thereof I direct that each devisee shall accept payment in the said bonds, all of which are to be taken at their face or par value. My beloved wife first taking choice of such of the said bonds as she may prefer, to an amount, the face or par value of which is equal to the legacy to her, and that my nieces and nephews and Samuel Bland the son of my friend James E. Bland, and Lewis H. Tomstall and his sister Nannie shall next be entitled to the choice of the said bonds, in the order in which the devisees are made to them respectively.

3^o I direct that the balance of my bonds, due from corporations or private individuals, my lands, with the mill situated thereon, with all my house and kitchen furniture, implements, vehicles, live stock of all kinds, and every other species of property of whatever description I may die possessed shall constitute the residue of my estate, to be disposed of as hereinafter directed, and I direct further that my said lands and mill, with the above named furniture, implements, live stock, vehicles &c shall be sold by my Executor hereinafter named, and the proceeds thereof paid over to the parties whom I shall devise the said residue.

4th I devise to the Trustees of Richmond College all the rest and residue of my estate, which I direct shall be invested and held by them and their successors in office, in trust the interest on which I desire shall be appropriated annually, by them to aid the

Young men seeking to acquire an education for the
purpose of becoming ministers of religion in the Baptist
Church.

I constitute and appoint my friends Mr. Samuel
F. Harwood and S. James E. Bland, executors of
this my last will and testament, and request that
they may not be required to give security to any bond
they may have to execute in that character.

I wish the following writing to constitute and form
the Codicil to my will, dated 15th December 1875
and hereto annexed; my wife is at liberty to hold
possession and occupy my place of residence at Elsworth,
with all buildings and appurtenances, and four
hundred acres of land adjoining, in as compact
a body as may be most suitable so long as she
may wish or desire, without charge, the said
land not to be rented out, or any timber cut or
taken from the land, the said land to be delivered
my executors whenever she may be willing to do so,
and to be received by them (and disposed of by
them as hereinbefore requested, ^{and proceeds of sale applied as hereinbefore requested} my wife may
select such house and kitchen — as she may
desire without any charge for it, and hold and
appropriate it as she pleases. I wish my Executors
to retain and hold an amount in money sufficient
for all probable contingencies or wants.

And on motion of Samuel F. Harwood, and James E. Bland the Executors therein named, who made oath thereto, entered into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of Sixty thousand dollars, conditioned as the Court directs, without surety (the Testator having provided in his said will that no surety be required of his said Executors, certificate is granted them for obtaining a probat of said will in due form
