of the State of Virginia, do make and ordain this to
be my last will and testament, as follows: viz:

I wish all my just debts to be paid out of my
property and after this is done; I bequeath one hundred
dollars to the body of Christians worshipping at, and
known at present, as the seventh Street Christian Church
in Richmond Virginia: I do not wish this money
to carry interest, but to be paid in annual instalments
of ten dollars to the elders and pastor of said Church,
to be used by them for the spread of the Gospel, in
whatever way they deem best for the object I have
in view, namely the preaching of the Gospel.

I bequeath to my niece Sallie B. Pollard, eldest
daughter of my brother Joseph L. Pollard one half dozen
of my silver teaspoons. I bequeath to my niece Mary
Brooke Pollard, second daughter of my said brother
Joseph, my saddle;

I bequeath to my niece Kate Herbert Pollard Third
daughter of my said brother Joseph, one half dozen
of my silver tablespoons.

I bequeath to my brother Joseph L. Pollard 2 beds

3^d I bequeath to my nephew Charley Jones one bed the

4th I bequeath to my nephew Walker Jones, my resid
Oakley with two hundred and fifty acres of land
and the remainder of said farm Oakley, to my
niece Sally J. Jones. I wish the division betw
them, to be so made, that the western portion
it shall be Sally's and shall extend from the
Tuckahoe swamp to the road which passes in
front of Oakley in order that Sally's part of
the farm may front on that road.

The remainder of my property I bequeath to my
nephew Walker Jones.

This writing purporting to be the last will and
testament of Susan F. Pollard decd. was produced
in Court, and there being no subscribing witness
thereto, John D. Hutchinson and John F. De
were sworn and severally deposed that they
were acquainted with the Testatrix's hand writing
and verily believe the said writing, and the name
thereto subscribed to be wholly written by the Testatrix
own hand. Whereupon the said writing is ordered
to be recorded as the true last will and testament
of the said Susan F. Pollard decd. And on the motion
of Joseph L. Pollard (who made oath thereto)
Administration of the estate of the said Susan
F. Pollard decd. with her will annexed is granted
him. And thereupon the said Joseph L. Pollard
together with John D. Hutchinson his sworn
Clerk justified on oath as to his sufficiency

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entered into and acknowledged a bond in the
penalty of One thousand dollars, conditioned ac-
cording to law.
