one dark bay horse one light bay do. one horse cart two plowes
two cultivators (of) nine head of hogs thirty fowls one cow
and my house hold & kitchen furniture to wit three beds
four stools two tables one sofa, one spider two pots and all
other housekeeping implements about my house, also my
crop of Corn for this year and whatever Crops I may
hereafter make, also my fodder and shucks from year
to year. This above is a true copy of my Will and
testimony to my wife Sarah A. Smith Given under
my hand this 15th day of Oct 1867

In the name of God Amen I Joseph Smith by this
of the County of King and Queen do make and ordain
this to be my last Will and Testament

First. I wish all my just debts be paid and I
charge that portion of my estate not devised to my wife
with the payment of the same.

2d. I give and bequeath to my living wife Margaret
my land and plantation wherein I now live containing
about two hundred acres also the following slaves named
George, Martha, Amy, and her young child not named
John and Emily, my carriage and horses harnessed
and kitchen furniture plantation utensils of every
description one yoke of best oxen, and three sheep worth
one thousand five hundred dollars to be paid her in money
and Rations for her and in time of want my estate

(3) All the real and residue of my Estate both real and personal I direct shall be sold by my executors hereafter named and the proceeds thereof together with any and all of my chattels that may remain after the payment of my debts I wish to be divided into six equal parts one of which I give to the children of my deceased brother George le Suffries equally between them, one to my brother Lewis Suffries, one to my sister Nancy Turner and one to my sister Frances Hart, one otherwise I lend unto my brother William S Suffries during his life and after his death the same to return to my estate and be divided as hereinafter directed and the remaining 3/6ths I give to my brother Lewis Suffries to be by him held in trust for the exclusive use and benefit of my Sister Susan Corlett for and during her life and after her death I give the same to be equally divided between her children.

(4) That portion of my Estate I leave to my brother Lewis Suffries during his life and which will return to the hands of my executors I give as follows one fifth to my brother Lewis Suffries one fifth to either of his children or my deceased brother George le Suffries equally between, one fifth to my sister Nancy Turner, one fifth to my sister Frances Hart and the remaining portion to my brother Lewis Suffries in trust for the benefit of my Sister Susan Corlett as aforesaid and then to his children.

With suddenly I constitute and appoint my brother Lewis Suffries and my friend John Dalland by either my last will and testament or by his will or by his executors holding and managing my estate the 13 day of March 1855
