to every whereof the said John Lichard hath hereunto set his hand and sealed the same  
above written.

in witness whereof he doth hereby acknowledge have granted bargained and sold and do by these presents  
Bennet Sifcomb of the same County and parish of the other part 115. Deed No. 115  
bargain and sell unto the said Bennett Sifcomb a tract of land lying and being in the parish  
aforesaid containing two hundred and thirteen acres of being a part of the tract of land belonging  
to the Estate of Drury Ragsdale deceased and purchased by the said Langborne from Drury Ragsdale  
as follows to wit Beginning at a pointes to an old stem of a white oak tree  
on the side of a branch from thence down the branch as it meanders forty eight poles to a spot three  
hundred and forty poles to a person's stakes corner with the residue of said Drury Ragsdale's  
land by a line south seventy one and a half degrees West eighty eight poles to a white oak stand  
on the side of a branch from thence down the branch as it meanders forty eight poles to a spot three  
hundred and forty four and a half degrees West sixteen poles to a corner pointers to standing pine timber then  
three hundred and forty two degrees West fifteen poles overing the Chapman swamp to a corner tree with the land of  
Foward Sifcomb thence north ten degrees West six poles to a white oak thence north fifteen degrees  
West twenty one pole to an older white oak thence north eighteen degrees West twenty two poles  
to a side white oak thence north thirty one degrees West six poles to a white oak thence to the  
Chapman swamp as it meanders dividing this from Foward Sifcomb's land to Helling  
Branch thence up that branch as it meanders dividing this from the land of John  
Lichard and thence forth to a corner with said Helling's tree and tree thence  
a half degree East thirty one poles to a large standing white oak thence westward
