

Spring to a Stake in the ditch, then with the ditch Southward
thirty and twenty pole to another stake then with forty eight
East eighty eight pole to a Sycamore on the river Bank thence down
the river as it meanders One hundred and thirty pole to the beginning
together with all and singular the premises emoluments and appartenances
thereunto belonging to have and to hold the said land and premises
honestly conveyed and every part and parcel thereof unto him the said
Anthony Thomas his heirs and assigns forever in full absolute and uncontrouled
disposal for himself to his and their only proper use and behoofe And
the said George Isbell for himself his heirs executors and administrators
both further covenant and agree to and with the said Anthony
Thomas his heirs and assigns that he the said George Isbell his heirs
and executors shall and may honestly convey and every
part and parcel thereof unto the said Anthony Thomas his heirs and
assigns with full force intent and defend against the right little claim
and demand of all and every person and persons whatsoever In testimony
whereof the said George Isbell and Susanna his wife have hereunto
subscribed their names and affixed their seals the day and year
first above written

Be it in witness of Edmund & Samuel Elliott Joseph Hillyard
and John Fox Gentlemen Justices of King William County testifying where
George Isbell and Susanna his wife have by their certain Indenture
of bargains and sales bearing date the first day of February, sold and
conveyed unto Anthony Thomas fifty and one half Acres of land
and appartenances lying in the County of King William, and
whereas the Susanna cannot conveniently travel to the Court of the
said County of King William to make Acknowledgment of the said
Indenture. Therefore we do give unto you or any two or more of you power
to receive the acknowledgment which the said Susanna shall be willing
to make of the conveyance aforesaid contained in the said Indenture
which is annexed and we do therefore command you that you do
personally go to the said Susanna and receive her acknowledgment
of the same and require her freely and a free from his said Husband
whether she doth the same freely and voluntarily without his persuasion
or enticement and whether she doth the same freely and voluntarily

King William aforesaid and where you
acknowledgment and represent her affeit that you distinctly and
certify to us thereof in our said Court under your seals sending them
the next witness Robert Pollard Clerk of our said Court this 8th day
February 1803 in the 27th year of our foundation, Robert Pollard &c
King William County 54

By virtue of this will to us and others directed
we did personally go to the said Susanna the wife of George Isbell and
examined her privly and a part from her said husband and she acknow-
ledg'd the indenture hereunto annexed to be her act and deed and that she in
setting the same should be recorded in our County Court of King William
that she did the same voluntarily without the persuasions or hind-
rance of her said husband Given under our hands and seals this eighteenth
day of May 1803

In Court of monthly session convened and held for King William
only at the courthouse on Tuesday the 28th of April 1807
a deed from George Isbell and wife to Thomas was proved by the oaths
of three witnesses there to and together with the commission annexed
the certificate of the question an order to be recorded

We all men by these presents that we Andrew and Madeline Al-
len are held and firmly bound unto William H. Cabell Governor of
our Commonwealth of Virginia in the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars
which payment shall and truly to be made to the said Governor
his successors we bind ourselves and every of us our and every of our
heirs and administrators jointly and severally by these presents witness our
hands and seals this 28th day of April 1807 in the 27th year of our
Independence.

The condition of the above obligation is such that when
the above bound Madeline Lipscomb hath obtained a license to keep an
Ordinary at Ayette in the County of King William of therefore the
said Madeline Lipscomb hath constantly had and provided on her and her
good wholesome and cleanly lodging and diet for Travellers and Fellers
foote and passegear or pasture and præsider as the said
require for three hours pre and during the term of one year
day of the date of these presents and from thence till the
Court held for the said County of King William and what and
and permit any enterprize
