of King & Queen in the state of Virginia for divers good causes consideration me
hereto moving, have made, ordain, authorized and appointed, and by the presents
do make, ordain, authorize and appoint Edward Earlick of the county of King
William in the said State, my true and lawful attorney, for me and in my
name, and to my uses, to ask demand, sue for recover, and receive all debts
that I am entitled or have a right to from any person, whomsoever, and
sums and sums of money, debts and duties whatsoever, which now are due and
unto me: this to have, use and take all lawful ways and means in my name
otherwise, for recovery thereof, and to agree and compound for the same, and
ances and other discharges for the same for me and in my name to make, and
deliver: and do all other lawful acts & things whatsoever concerning the premises
as fully in every respect as I myself might or could do, if I were personally
ratifying and allowing all and whatsoever my said attorney shall or
lawfully do or cause to be done in and about the premises, by virtue of

was acknowledged by the said Temple and ordered to be recorded

One thousand eight hundred and thirteen, Between William Temple and
 King William in the state of Virginia of the one part, and Edward Garlick of the
 the other part Witnesseth that the said William Temple and for and in consideration
 sum of five dollars of lawful money of Virginia to him in hand paid by the said
 Garlick, the receipt whereof he doth hereby acknowledge, also for and in consideration of
 Edward Garlick's having for some short time heretofore furnished the said William
 son with board and cloths, and also for and in consideration of the said Edward Garlick
 having agreed and promised to furnish the said William Temple and with comfortable
 cloths, and maintenance during his natural life, hath given, granted, bargained
 sold, and by these presents doth give, grant bargain and sell unto the said Edward Garlick
 the following negro slaves, to wit a woman named Grace and his child named William
 the future increase of the said Grace, a woman named Jan and her two children named
 Rose and Harrison and the future increase of the said Jan, also all his right, title
 claim and demand in and to a sum of money supposed to be about six hundred pounds and
 the interest thereon which was devised to the said William Temple and by the last will
 and testament of his grand father Theophilus Fields, for the recovery of which a suit is
 now depending in the superior Court of Chancery for the Richmond district, and also all
 his right, title, interest, claim and demand in and to a certain tract or parcel of land
 lying situate in the county of mecklenburg in the said state, containing by estimation
 four hundred and six acres more or less with its appurtenances, and being the same tract
 or parcel of land which was devised to the said William Temple and by the last will
 testament of his grand father Theophilus Fields. To have and to hold the said slaves
 with their future increase, the said sum of money and interest and the said tract or parcel
 of land with its appurtenances unto the said Edward Garlick his heirs and assigns for
 ever provided nevertheless one thing being contained to the contrary notwithstanding
 that if the said Edward Garlick his heirs, executors administrators shall hereafter refuse to
 board, cloth, and maintain the said William Temple and in a comfortable manner
 during his natural life, that then and from that time the indenture and covenants
 herein contained shall cease, determine and be void. And the said Edward Garlick for
 himself, his heirs, executors and administrators doth by these presents covenant, agree and with
 the said William Temple and that he the said Edward Garlick or his heirs, executors,
 or administrators, will give the said sum of five dollars, board, cloths and maintain the said
 William Temple in a comfortable manner during his natural life. In witness
