At a Court held for the County of Lincoln the 10th day of September 1874.
The Will was proved by the oath of James Knoll and Frank R. R. R. Witnesses
Knoll and R. R. R. were sworn to be sworn and on the motion of John Knoll were
declared. Knoll here of the executor herein named who made oath
Knoll and together with Lynch, Marshall and William Taylor these
herein stated entered into and acknowledged their Oath in the penalty
of three hundred pounds of fine conditioned as the law directs, Knoll
was named then for obtaining a part of the said will in due form
being received for the other executor herein named to be sworn
the part when he shall think fit. Mary Knoll widow of the Testator
not being satisfied with the provision made for her by the said will
formally appeared in Court and requested that the said will
be set aside and the executor of her estate be appointed a new
one and also that she be appointed executor of her estate.

Will in manner and form following, That is to say, First I recom-

of my Executors and what worldly goods I do have been pleased to
bequeath unto my wife and daughter as follows, I bequeath unto my
wife with unto my loving wife Ann Phillips out of the love
and tender affection I have for her the following slaves, George
Bailey, Chapman, John, Peter a Negro Woman, Robert Smith
and one child Tom. To have and to hold the said slaves to her or
her assigns and not subject to the control of any person what-
soever with my plantation on the Long Branch river. I do be-
queath all my stock of cattle, hogs and sheep. These I do bequeath
unto half of all my household and kitchen furniture. I do be-
queath unto the following names, John Smith
