my trust in the hands of John Phillips who has it and trust
being in the north to be brought in several months at the receipt
of my Certificate and what worldly goods I have had been made to
leave with me I give and bequeath as follows, I give and bequeath
and bequeath with my loving Wife Ann Phillips out of the love
and tender affection I have for her the following Slaves, George
Charles, Abraham, John, Peter or Negro Woman, David Smith
and her child I do have and to hold the said Slaves to her or
her heirs and assigns and not subject to the control of any person what
soever with my plantation on the Long Branch river I do have
have all my stock of cattle, Hogs and Sheep, three horses and two
cows, half of all my household and kitchen furniture, I do
more will make to also after the following Horses, Jack, Dick
Andrew, Horses belonging her National, like and after her
decease for all the Slaves and their Increase Land and other
furniture, Books, &c. as may be left after raising my Child
to return into my beloved Daughter, Phillis Phillips.

leave all my stock of butter, sugar and other provisions
here, half of all my household and kitchen furniture, also my
wearing apparel & also after the following horses have been
distributed among my children, my natural life and after my
decease for all the slaves and their increase have and who
furniture, & as may be left after satisfying my children
to retain with my children, Darius Phillips, Phebe Phillips,

also my five children to come in for a suitable part and
to be equally divided between them, The Master
has accepted, as I intend that for my son
William I give and bequeath unto my eldest son
Randolph he at present lives on his farm and

I have but a son, I intend that
he shall have the same

at ab. a. I give unto my daughter Betty a Negro Girl
named Fanny a mother bed and furniture a saddle to be
bought for her out of my estate in Mass. called Fanny to
her and her heirs for ever. Item And in case of the death of the
said Betty without issue in that case I desire her estate may
be equally divided among her brothers and sisters. Item I give
unto my son William Phillips a Negro Man named Sam
also a good named Fanny, one feather bed and furniture a
clock, looking glass and Table a Turkey with the plantation
and present live on containing by estimation three hundred
acres more or less to dole to him and his heirs for ever. Item
And in case of the death of the said William Phillips and having
no issue and not arriving to higher age in that case I
desire his estate may be equally divided among his
brothers and sisters except the land which I desire my
son William Phillips may have. Item I give unto my daughter
Betty

Now and not arriving to better age in that case I
desire his estate may be equally divided among his
children and I desire except the land which I desire my
son William Phillips may have. Now I give unto my daughter
Sarah first a Negro Woman named Patty and her Increase
to her and her heirs forever. Now I desire as soon as I can
have my home sold may be sold and the money arising
from such sale be towards defraying expenses. Now I
leave my beloved wife Anne Phillips my Son Dabney Phillips
and William Johnson Executors of this my last will and Testament
In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my
seal this twenty sixth day of July in the year of our Lord 1761.
