 the money which ever she chooses to be at her own disposal. Then
 my will and desire is that after the death of the said Francis Willson that
 the whole of my then remaining Estate both Real and personal I give and
 bequeath to Burwell and Apollonia Burwell to be equally divided unto be-
 tween them with except my Negro fellow slave who I give unto Isaac
 Burwell Son of Westbury County for a working man during his
 Natural life and after his death I give the said Negro unto Burwell
 Burwell and his heirs forever. Then my will and desire is that the

Therefore my will and desire is, that all the Remainder and residue of that tract or parcel of land lying on Big River, in the County of Franklin late the property of my Father, not by him conveyed away or otherwise disposed. Be and come unto the said Colonel Lewis Burwell to him and his heirs forever.

with according to law and together with the (P. Pomeroy and Richard) the family of 1800 purchased according to law. (Culpeper is granted to) (Richard Wilton not as the former) (Culpeper is 1800)

And I declare the above to be made by my doing and I have also the same to my last will and Testament by way of bequest, and I command and appoint my truly and well beloved friends Lewis Burwell, Wm. Hopturn, Sam^r Belter and James Coleman Esqrs to this Codicil Signed with my hand and sealed with my Seal this ninth day of February Anno Domini 1778

take upon himself the executorship thereof. And at a Court held for
the same County the 8th day of July following the said will was
further proved by the oath of Henry Anderson another witness thereto,
and the said Codicil was also further proved by the oaths of Remondin
Balsore and Philip Boinsay the two other witnesses thereto, and together
with the said Will ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of Remondin
Burrill a lawyer who made oath thereto and together with Edwards &
Tate, William W. Green and Abraham Kane his depositions entered into
and acknowledged that he was in the privacy of two thousand pounds
conditioned as the Law directs and certificate was granted him for obtaining
Letters of Administration on the estate of Richard Watson and with his
said Will and Codicil returned in due form.
