In the name of God amen I William Rhodes of Cumberland County
being of sound sense and memory the weak in body but feeling towards the
uncertainty of life and certainty of Death desire to settle my worldly
Business in manner as follows as follows I do hereby give and will by me
Truly made and do affirm that this is my last will and Testament
It may be Received as such And I do desire that after my Death I shall be
Here I leave my loved daughter formerly lived in Summerville my Negro
Fellow Harry and my Will in the hands of my Executors like my son Lisha
Rhodes shall take in and deliver to my Executors my Bond at Sinter St
In amount of about sixteen or twenty pounds and pay other debts and
shall direct which if he refuses to pay Executors are to see as much of that
Part of my property as will pay those debts and after that done I give the
Remainder of those articles to my son Lisha Rhodes to have and his heirs
Forever my Testament is to be sold if Harry and the Will will pay the debt
Then I give to my son William Rhodes at my death my bed of fur
ture and wearing clothes to him and his heirs forever
Then I leave to my Daughter Sarah Rhodes a Negro woman named
Mary to maintain her at my son John Rhodes's will if there are to be
removed out of his family and at her Death I leave the said Mary woman

in articles of about twelve or twenty pounds and to pay other debts as I

shall direct, which if he refuses to pay Executors are to see as much of them

as they can, as will pay these debts and after that done I give the

Remainder of these articles to my son Joshua Rhodes to him and his heirs

Forever my Land is not to be sold if Harry and the Wife will pay the debt

Here I give to my son William Rhodes at my death my bed of furs

and wearing clothes to him and his heirs forever

Here I leave to my Daughter Sarah Rhodes a Negro woman named

Ulag to maintain her at my son John Rhodes's will, after she is taken

out of his family and at her death I give the said Negro woman

and ^{her} increase from this date to my son John Rhodes to him and his heirs

Forever

If I have anything left after my death I desire it may

be equally divided amongst all my Children and last of all I appoint

my son John Rhodes and Randolph Rhodes Executors of this my last

will and Testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand

and affixed my seal this first day of November one thousand seven hundred

and eighty six

In obedience to an order of the worshipful Court of Shenandoah County we
 the subscribers have proceeded to divide the estate of Jacob Buggs dec'd between
 his sisters Betty Hopkins and Lucy Buggs decedents agreeable to the last will
 and Testament of the said decedent

The parties being of lawful age

and mutually consenting to divide the same in the manner following Viz

By a line beginning at a stump in a corner of a tract near the fall of the
 Rock at a corner better known as a corner of a tract of land of the same
 bounded to the north by the river Shenandoah to the east by a line of land
