day of Nov. 1780, to the Subscribers appointed in the said Order to Divide  
the Estate of Lodenick Jones Dec'd. according to his Will, held at the House of  
Mr. Lucy Jones & first proceeded to lay off & allot unto the said Lucy Jones her  
Dower in the Land of the said Lodenick Jones Dec'd. as follows, to wit, Beginning at  
a large Hickory by the road side in the line of Col<sup>r</sup> Corbin the land he purchased of  
Parratt, thence along a line of Market Trees near a fence to a large White Oak  
on the North side of a Branch, thence along & up the said Branch to Black Walnut  
Tree, thence through a piece of Woods, along a line of Market Trees to another line  
of Col<sup>r</sup> Corbins in the Hall Quarter Tenant bounded by the said Corbins lines to

towards the payment of the s<sup>d</sup> Jones's Debts and which was part of the Estate recd. by  
the said Lodenick Jones with his said Wife, And the Balance of £212.. 5.. was rated in  
Tob: at 19/- & 6/- & then turned the said Tob: into Cash, at the Rate last settled by the  
Grand Jury to wit 60/- by which it appears that the sum of £13406.. 4.. is due
