every description be paid

I give and bequeath unto my wife
Elizabeth the lower end of the tract

which is described "Lies" to last
and be a fence to be run along
the same from the pickings of the
river, and a break in the fence

beginning of vessels on the hill above the
house, with liberty of firewood for fuel and
firewood, & any place I desire, also
also the following articles belonging
to her, Chair, and Bedstead and as many
of their children as desiring choice
to have, also one half of my household
and kitchen furniture, and all farm instruments
tools, etc, etc, to her use and benefit

leaving her an attorney at law, also give and
bequeath unto her one half of my farm of
144 acres, to let her have it and to let her
work there.

Give and bequeath also my horses
and son in law Samuel to execute all
my pleasure and intent as above

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thousand acres of land I might
an hour need to be fully exercised
over them according to the necessities
thereof to them and their heirs forever

I give and bequeath unto my son-in-law

Henry Smith my tract of land lying
in the old church in the County of Loud-

on-pine ^{Montgomery County Wills Deeds Estates No 2 1809-1817}
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to property and right of the same from the
time of my death, also give and
bequeath unto him and his wife
and their issue all his freehold and waste

ground to him and his wife, also

land or pasture of my neighbors
(Henry & Robert)

I give and bequeath unto my son John M. Taylor
Taylor the upper end of the tract of land
whereon I now live a tract of fifty five acres

adjoining also all my lands or shall be
below the south thereof and adjoining

thereto, all debts that my son can due
me also my negroes Bob, Achilles,

Peter, and the rest half of my stocks
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of every kind, household and kitchen
furniture and farming utensils to a prop-
erty and enjoy the same from the time
of my death until the death of my
wife. I also give and bequeath unto
her the other part of the tract of land
whereon I now live also my negroes.

Joe, Edmund, Joshua, and Esther, and

the remainder of my household and all
other furniture and farming utensils
to form up to his heirs forever. I bind
Ovide C. M. G. to receive that my said
son John pay unto my son William
and daughter Elizabeth Crockett
the sum of fifty dollars each.

I give and bequeath unto Sally
Perry ~~the~~ ~~second~~ ~~one~~ ~~and~~ ~~last~~ ~~half~~ ~~of~~ ~~my~~ ~~land~~ ~~base~~.

All gifts of property heretofore made
to any of my wife or her children by
them or their heirs forever
I do hereby declare that any
of the lands heretofore or hereby dis-
posed of shall go to my
wife and decree that my other

Condition is my Estate shall not in any
manner be liable for such damage more
over than ~~any~~ damages be recovered.

In a suit now pending against me by
the executors of Colonel George's further
Long bottom tract of land that may
be sold or given to my daughter pay

such ~~sum~~ money as, or pro rata her heirs

do so, in order and direct that my Executor
make sale of the said ^{tract of} land, on
the best terms they can, and after ^{paying} damages
as far as may the balance to my daughter
Mary McAnelly or her heirs, and in the
Court of the said damages as being recoverable
as it is my will that my daughter

May or her heirs receive the sum
of said tract of land from this time

I constitute and appoint my sons
Charles Taylor and John McCaskey

My executors of this my will.

Who are not to be bound in any way con-

ntrary ~~or to~~ ^{to} my appraisement

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of my Estate and I do revoke and
make void all other wills before
made and declare this only to be

my last will and testament.

Executors herein named who made his mark to this record

St. M^tgomery February Court 1811 Recd last
will & testament of John Taylor dec'd was presented
in Court prouen by the oaths of Thomas Compton
farmer Charlton and Thomas Compton the writing
thereon and ordered to be Recorded

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and on the 1st day of March A.D. 1811 Charles Taylor one of the
executed his will named who made on the 1st day of March
going to Law. Certificate is granted him for
obtaining a probat thereof in due form - security
not being given the testator having directed the
law.
