

James Kiddick's In the name of God, amen I, James Kiddick of the upper parish of Nausmond-
Will. County, in the State of Virginia being sick and knowing it is appointed for all
men once to die, but being of sound mind and memory, do make and ordain
this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following. First I recom-
end my soul into the hands of All mighty God that gave it. My Body to be buried
in a Christian like manner at the discretion of my Executors here after named
and as to Such worldly property as God has blessed my labours with I give and
dispose of the same in the following manner to wit: 1st Item. I lend to my
beloved wife Katherine Kiddick, my plantation whereon I now live, also
my negro woman named Charlotte & my negro man Mongo, one horse
& gig, and the use of my stile, one Walnut Table, one Boff and all in it
Half dozen Windsor chairs, one good bed & furniture, also one cart, wheels
& gear, one cow & calf, to her my said wife during her natural life, 2nd
Item I give unto my son Edward Kiddick, the plantation called
the bull branch and all the rest of my land not mentioned including
the land lent my wife after her decease to him and his heirs and assigns
forever also one negro boy named Nathan to him & his heirs forever
3rd Item I give to my daughter Nancy Kiddick, one negro man named
Lewis, one bed & furniture one pine chest, to her and her heirs forever.
4th Item I give to my daughter Mary Ann Kiddick one negro boy named
Joas, one feather bed & furniture, one chest, to her and her heirs forever.
5th Item I give to my daughter Manah Kiddick, one negro man Sam,
one bed & furniture to her and her heirs forever. 6th Item my will and desire
is that my negro man Oliver be sold on a credit of six months for the express
purpose of paying my debts. 7th Item my will and desire is that my he.

Item 5th. I give to my daughter Mariah Reddick, one negro man Sam, one bed & furniture to her and her heirs forever. 6th. Item my will and desire is that my negro man Oliver be sold on a credit of six months for the express purpose of paying my debts. Item 7th. my will and desire is that my beloved wife Katharine Reddick have the use of Charlottes child, to wit. Jere, during her natural life, and after her death my will and desire is that all the property left my wife of all kinds be equally divided between all my children that may be alive at the death of my said wife Katharine Reddick also the balance of my property not hitherto given away. I wish after paying my just debts if any remainder be all so equally divided between all my living children and their heirs forever. Lastly I nominate and appoint my beloved wife Katharine Reddick, my Soul Executrix to execute this my last will and testament, without being compelled to give bond & security according to Law I also revoke and disannul all former wills & testaments ratifying & confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 21st day of October 1822.

In Henric County Court the 10th day of May 1824. This Testament

and last Will of James Riddick dec^d. was put into Court. by Katherine Riddick, the Executrix herein named and sworn to by her and being proved by the oaths of all the subscribing witnesses, was ordered to be recorded and on the motion of said Executrix, Certificate was granted her. For obtaining a probat thereof in due form she having made oath and entered into bond with the penalty of Ten Thousand Dollars. without security the will requiring none conditioned according to law.
