state of Virginia, being of sound and disposing mind & memory and call-  
ing to mind the uncertainty of human life, do make and appoint this to be  
my last will and testament, in manner and form as follows, to wit:



I then the 1st. I give and bequeath unto my wife, Mary Ann, the following -  
slaves, to w<sup>t</sup>: Barbara, Journa, Tom, Neverson, and Peggy. Item the  
2nd: I lend unto my wife Mary Ann, during her natural life, my place  
Georgiana, also I lend unto my wife Mary Ann, during her nat-  
ural life, all my chattel estate, consisting of moneys, and bonds be-  
stock of all kinds, household and kitchen furniture and all & every species  
of chattel property. Item the 3rd: all the balance of my property, together  
with the two slaves, Jordan & Georgiana and chattel estate and  
labeled my wife Mary Ann I desire to be distributed as the law would  
do it among the children that may be living at the time of my death  
of my sisters Mary Jane & Sarah Ann and also my half sisters Senton  
& Patsy. I do hereby nominate and appoint my wife Mary Ann, the  
executrix of this my last will and testament, and I do hereby  
declare these presents to be and contain my last will and testa-  
ment. In witness whereof I the said testator have hereunto set  
my hand and seal, this 15<sup>th</sup> day of April 1862.

2nd: I lend unto my wife Mary Ann, during her natural life, my plantation and lands of every description and also slaves, viz. Jordan & Georgiana, also I lend unto my wife Mary Ann, during her natural life, all my chattel estate, consisting of moneys, and bonds the stock of all kinds, household and kitchen furniture and all & every species of chattel property. Item the 3rd: all the balance of my property together with the two slaves, Jordan & Georgiana and chattel estate lands loaned my wife Mary Ann I desire to be distributed as the law would do it among the children that may be living at the time of my death of my sisters Mary, Jane & Sarah Ann and also my half sisters Senton & Patsey. I do hereby nominate and appoint my wife Mary Ann the Executrix of this my last will and testament, and I do hereby declare these presents to be and contain my last will and testament. In witness whereof I the said Testator have hereunto set my hand and seal, this 15th day of April 1862.
