Re: Lawrence'
Will:

In the name of God Amen. I Re: Lawrence, being of sound mind but
of very feeble body, do make this my last Will and Testament, written with
my own hand, and sealed with my seal, in manner, following, to wit:
I give to my beloved wife, during her life, all my Estate Real and Per-
sonal or chattle, hereby authorising her to sell any part, if she finds
it necessary for her support or comfort. After the death of my wife, I,
desire that my Farm and any other property be sold and first pay
my daughter Sarah Godwin, One thousand dollars, and then divide

the balance, equally divided between my son Robert and my son George. If my son Robert is living, or returns to claim his share, I wish him to have an equal portion. Having given my son George, more than is now left my other children, I only give him a set of Table spoons which were my Father's and an old family arm chair, which was my Father's also. And lastly I appoint my friend Geo: H. Crump, Executor of this my will; and ask the Court, to require no security for the performance of my desire as I have every confidence in his honor & integrity, and feel willing to trust to untold treasure.

In evidence whereof I have set my hand and seal this 28th day October 1865.

At a Quarterly Court held for Stanswade County the 12th. day of November 1866:

This writing, purporting to be the Last Will and Testament of Robert Lawrence, late of this County deceased, was this day, presented to the Court, and there being no subscribing witnesses to the said Will, John McCowling and John R. Darden, were sworn and severally deposed that they were well acquainted with the hand writing of the said Robert Lawrence deceased, and verily believe that the said Will and the signature there to subscribed are wholly in the hand writing of the said Robert Lawrence deceased: Whereupon the same, is ordered to be recorded as the true last Will and Testament, of the said Robert Lawrence deceased.
