In the name of God, amen. I, Benjamin Timbulake of the County of New Kent being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make this my last will and Testament, in manner and form following (that is to say) First, I desire and direct that all of my just debts be paid and secondly I leave to my dear wife Eliza, in testimony of my sincere regard and affection for her all of my estate both real and personal to raise, educate and take care of my children, so long as she shall remain my widow, and if she shall marry again, then I desire that she shall be divided.

Thirdly, I desire that my whole estate be kept together till the death of my wife or marriage, and then to be equally divided between my children. That portion that would fall to my daughter Martha & M. Crump, deceased, I desire ~~and~~ give to her children, viz. Sarah Eliza, Charles, Benj. and James F. Crump, to be placed in the hands of James M. Taylor of Richmond till they arrive to the age of twenty one years. If, however, all of the four children shall die without an heir of their bodies, then their portion of my estate to return to my surviving children and the heirs of their bodies.

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Lastly, I appoint my wife Eliza my Executor to this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all other wills made by me. In testimony whereof I hereunto set my hand and seal this 29th day of September in the year of our Lord 1863.
