

New Kent County, January 5th, 1865; In the name of God amen
J. E. B. Pollard, considering the great uncertainty of life, do make and
declare this to be my will, hereby revoking all other and former wills by
me made and declare this to be my only will and testament.

I hereby appoint my brother T. F. Pollard my sole Executor, and leave
to him one half of all my property of every sort and kind during his life,
and should he die before my niece, Laura T. Pollard, then I direct that said
half go to her, and I direct that he hold the other half for the benefit of
my niece Laura T. Pollard and that he be permitted to advance it to her
in such sums and at such times as he may think best and should he out live
her I direct that he have the whole to do as he may please with.

I have written all this with my own hand and therefore it is not ne-
cessary to have it attested as the law directs. In witness of which I hereby
subscribe my name this 5th day of January, 1865.
