

J. John Richardson, of the County of New Kent, do make and ordain this my last will and testament. I give and bequeath what estate it has pleased God to bless me with in manner and form following: that is to say - I desire that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid. Secondly, I desire that my whole estate, both real and personal, be kept together during the natural life of my beloved wife, Mary H. Richardson, and at her death I desire that my whole estate real and personal be equally divided among all my children herein named, to wit: Susan Williams, Williams P. Richardson, James Richardson, Mary H. Richardson, Delia Richardson, Andrew P. Richardson, Angelina T. Richardson, Theophilus Richardson and Sylvester H. Richardson, except that in the disposition of my estate, I desire that my two youngest sons Theophilus and Sylvester H. Richardson, shall each be allowed the sum of one hundred dollars, and my youngest daughter Angelina T. Richardson be allowed the sum of fifty dollars, in addition to their proportion of my estate more than my other children for the purpose of raising and educating them. I desire that the income arising from my real and personal estate shall be appropriated towards the support of my wife and children, and towards the education of such of my children as shall not have completed their education and with those objects in view I hereby authorize my executors herein after named (after first obtaining the consent of my wife) to rent out such portions of my lands or hire out such of my negroes as they shall think necessary for their education and support. Lastly, I hereby constitute and appoint my two sons Williams P. Richardson and James Richardson and my friend John S. Lacy, executors of this my last will and testament.
