in Norfolk Town being in Perfect mind and Memory but calling  
to mind the ~~uncertainty~~ of this World, ~~I make and bequeath~~  
this to be my last Will and Testament. First I give my soul into  
the Hands of Almighty God that give unto me, hoping through the  
Merits of my Blessed Saviour Jesus Christ to Receive the same  
in Perfect Bless, and my Body to be Buried in a Decent manner by  
Executors, and unto my Worldly Estate I give and Bequeath of the same  
in Manner Following (viz) I give  
I give unto my Loving Wife Abigail Newton the Lot and Houses I  
now live on and the Lot and House that Mr John Duprey now  
lives on with all Houses Mr Greenleaf & Mr Hardin hath in Posses-  
sion and the Store House that Mrs Taylor and Capt John Willoughby



hath Rented of me and all the Houses for the Store Houses. That Mr.  
John Boyd and Mr. Aichison hath Rented of me with the Store House  
that Mr. Andrew Sprowle hath Rented of me all them being in  
Norfolk Town and Them I Give unto my wife Aphia Newton  
During her Natural Life and I Give unto my said Wife all my  
Household Goods and I Do also give unto my Wife the use of all  
my Negroes, Excepting what shall be hereafter given to my Children,  
during her Natural Life but not to Dispose of to Sell any of them  
and Give unto my wife Aphia Newton, my Plantation called by  
the Name of Popes, McCoy and Creekmurs, being about five  
Hundred Acres of Land. and I Give unto my said Wife During  
her Life the Plantation commonly called Satter, with Twenty  
Acres of Land joining to the same near Norfolk Town. Popes McCoy  
and Creekmurs Land so called to my Wife only during her life.  
I Give unto my son Thomas Newton after the Death of his Mother  
my Plantation commonly called Popes McCoy and Creekmurs  
being about Five Hundred Acres more or Less to him and to his  
Heirs for ever. I Give also to my son Thomas Newton all my  
Land Excepting One Acre, that is about half a Mile out of Norfolk

I give for ever I give also to my son Thomas Newton all my Land Excepting One Acre, that is about half a Mile out of Norfolk Town on the North West side of the main Road going out of Norfolk Town commonly called Sutters being in a Patent granted to John Adams formerly, which I give unto my son Thomas Newton and to his Heirs for ever after the Death of his Mother and I Further give and Bequeath unto my son Thomas Newton after the Death of his Mother all the Sett of Land he lives on in Norfolk Town and the next Lot joining to it only my son Wilson Newton to live in the House he now lives in during his Mothers Life all which I give unto my son Thomas Newton and to his Heirs for ever with the Cove joining to both the Lots, or almost lots out as far as the Barr <sup>off</sup> gains them unto him the said Thomas Newton and to his Heirs for ever, and I give unto my son Thomas Newton my Negroe man called Jeffrey a Smith to him and his Heirs for ever, I Give and bequeath unto my son Wilson Newton after the Death of his Mother the Lot of Land I now live upon, and the Lot or about a Lot be the same more or less that Mr John Duprey



after the Death of his Mother and I further give and Bequeath unto  
my son Thomas Newton after the Death of his Mother all the Lot of  
Land he lives on in Norfolk Town and the next Lot joining to it only  
my son Wilson Newton to live in the House he now lives in during  
his Mothers life all which I give unto my son Thomas Newton and  
to his Heirs for ever with the Cove joining to both the Lots or almost  
lots out as far as the Barr joins them unto him the said Thomas  
Newton and to his Heirs for ever and I give unto my son Thomas  
Newton my Negroe man called Jeffrey a Smith to him and his Heirs for ever  
I give and bequeath unto my son Wilson Newton after the  
Death of his Mother the Lot of Land I now live upon and the  
Lot or about a Lot be the same more or less that Mr John Duprey  
now lives on with all the Cove out to the Barr joining to the said  
Lots or almost Lots according as I had them by Deeds all which Lot  
with the Part of the Cove as above Expressed I give unto my son  
Wilson Newton and to his Heirs for ever and my Willand Desire is  
that my son Wilson Newton shall live in the House and have the

Ground for a garden; where he now lives during his Mothers  
Life and I Give unto my son Wilson Newton my Negro Man  
George a Sailor. I Give unto my son Wilson Newton my Plan-  
tation Commonly called Ellises with the Land Joining to  
the same with the Land called Owen Daughartie and the  
Land Down the Neck called Sparrow, and all the Land Joining  
to any of them that doth belong unto me. I Give unto my  
son Wilson Newton being as I suppose about Six Hundred  
acres of Land all I Give unto the said Wilson Newton and to his  
heirs for ever. Samuel Harris lives on some part of this Land.

I Give unto my son Wilson Newton, all the Land on the South East  
Side of the main Road going out of Norfolk Town being about thirty  
Acres be the same more or less it being part of a Patent that was  
Formerly granting to John Adams for a Greater Quantity. I Give unto  
my William Newton one Acre of Land on the North West side of  
the Road going out from Norfolk Town Joining unto the Land I  
have Given unto my son Thomas Newton to be one Hundred Foot  
of the main Road and then unto the Width to be meted in from it



have given unto my son Thomas Newton to be one Hundred Foot  
on the Main Road and then into the Woods to complete one Acre of  
Land unto him the said William Newton and to his Heirs for ever  
and I give unto Five Pounds in Money to be paid by Executors hereafter  
Named —

I give <sup>unto</sup> my Daughter Frances the wife of M<sup>r</sup> Paul Loyall a  
Molatto Boy named Lawrence and a Negro Boy called Tom to her  
and her Heirs for ever with Twenty Pounds current Gold or Silver of  
Virginia —

I give unto my Grandson George Cook when he attains or comes to  
the age of Twenty One Years my Negro Boy named Quash —

~~I give~~ <sup>unto</sup> my Daughter Elizabeth Bonbon that is now in Engl<sup>d</sup>  
Fifty Pounds current Gold or Silver of Virginia to be paid her by my  
Executors, —

I give unto my Wife Twenty Pounds in Money to be delivered her  
after my Death with the Cattle on the Plantation called Ropes, and  
the Cattle on Salers free having Full Liberty to keep the Plantation  
a Cattle during her Life the Cattle to Kill sell or Dispose of as she

I give my daughter Frances the wife of a white Boy a  
Molatto Boy named Lawrence and a Negro Boy called Tomb to her  
and her Heirs for ever with Twenty Poundes current Gold or Silver of  
Virginia

I give unto my Grandson George Cook when he attains or comes to  
the age of Twenty One Years my Negro Boy Named Quash  
I give <sup>unto</sup> my Daughter Elizabeth Denton that is now in Engl  
Fifty Poundes current Gold or Silver of Virginia to be paid her by my  
Executors,

I give unto my Wife Twenty Poundes in Money to be delivered her  
after my Death with the Cattle on the Plantation Called Popes, and  
the Cattle on Salters fher having Full Liberty to keep the Plantation  
a Cattle during her Life the Cattle to Kill Sell or Dispose of as she  
thinks Necessary;

And as to the Remaining Part of my Negroes after the Death of my  
wife I give them Men, Women and Children I give them unto my son  
Thomas Newton and my son Wilson Newton to be Equally divided  
between them or between their Heirs for ever



And lastly I do hereby ordaine constitute and Appoint my son  
Thomas Newton and my son Wilson Newton to be Executors of this my  
Last Will and Testament to perform, all and Every thing Mentioned  
herein, duly complied with in Witness whereof I have hereunto  
set my hand and Seal this Thirtieth Day of May 1753.
