soon it may please God to take me away so this is my last Will & Testa-
ment and first I give my soul to God that gave it me in hope he will
receive it mery and allowing worldly goods I give as followeth.

Item I give unto my Daughter Sarah a Negro Boy named Simon only who
being indebted unto her sister Amy five pound for the same gift of
the Boy.

Item I give my Daughter Eliz: a Negro Boy named Hann.

Item I give unto my son John my Plantation be four be a half and my
garding soil.

Item I give my fellow Jamey and my Wench Dinah to my son Mathew &
my Daughter Ifan and to my son William, she and all her increase
to be equally divided between them three only the said Fellow & Wench
to remain with my Wife her life time only paying my Daughter Amy
Ten pound and I give to my Wife Mary all that I have not given to these
several Persons and I do further make an appointment my Wife
Mary Godfrey my whole Excutrix to see this my last Will performed
at Witness my hand and seal this 4 day of January 1744.

Ten pounds and I give to my Wife Mary all that I have not given to the
several Persons and I do further make an appointment my Wife
Mary Godfrey my whole Excutrix to see this my last Will performed
as Witness my hand and seal this 4 day of January 1744.
