I give Devise and dispose of the Same in the following
manner and form that is I give to my Well beloved Son
Caleb Creekmur the one half of my Land that I now
live on and the Other half I give to my well beloved Son

out are that this Land to fall to their Sister Lyda Greckmer
Princess I give and bequeath to my Wellbeloved Wife Anne
Greckmer all my household Goods and the Moveables by her
Truly to be used and enjoyed confirming this to be my last
Will and Testament In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my
hand and Seal in the day and Year above Written
