in the Twenty fifth Year of the Kingdom of our Sovereign Lord George
the Second by the Grace of God of Great Britain &c. &c. &c. &c.
King Defender of the Faith and in the Year of our Lord Christ
one thousand seven hundred and Fifty three I William Senear
of the Western Branch of Elizabeth River in the County of Norfolk
Virginia being very Sick and Weak of Body, but of Sound and
Perfect Mind and Memory Blessed be God for it Therefore

getting to mind the Mortality of this World. And I am now it is Appointed
for all men to be put to rest in the most comfortable and Appointed this
to be my Last Will and Testament in manner and form following that
to say forth and lastly I recommend myself to Almighty God
Who gave it and being to be buried this the only Son and the Relation
of our blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ and my body I commend
the Earth from whence it was taken to be buried in a Christian and
Decent manner by my Executors hereafter named I do this but at the
General Resurrection I shall rise again by the Mighty
Power of God And as touching those Worldly Goods I do bequeath by
Wherewith I have possessed God to bless and I give bequeath to
Disposed of them in the following manner & form

I Will that all my Just Ditties and several Charges to be discharged
in a convenient time after my Decease by my Executors
I bequeath I shall give for statute, and Appoint my Dear beloved
Wife Frances Leavelle to be Joint Executors of this my Last
Will and Testament

Item I give and bequeath to my Wellbeloved Wife Frances Leavelle
all the Plantations whereon I lived during her Widow

good and then to fall and belong to my Dearly beloved Son John
Lumpling I give and bequeath to my Dearly beloved Wife the 1/3 of
all my Negroes Movable & Cattle Hogs, Sheep and all my things
During & Widowhood and then to fall to my Dearly beloved
Children to have it all divided Equally amongst them all and
my Dearly beloved Grandson William Manning And if he Dies
Without Issue I carefully begeth of his Body for it to fall to my
Children again John Lumpling, Sarah Lumpling, Frank Lumpling
Anna Lumpling, Ann Lumpling, Abner Lumpling, Eddie Lumpling
and Abner Lumpling to have their Equal Parts alike in part my
Wife Marries she shall take only the 1/3 and a third her 1/3 and then
to fall to my Children again And I do hereby Revoked & Disannul
all former and Other Wills by me hereof made and any such and found
Retracting and for forming this One Will to be my Last Will & Testament
Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & Seal the day & Year
first above Written

In the Name of God Amen I Edward Swelling of Norfolk County
Virginia being of Sound and Perfect Mind and Memory Thanks be to
God for it Therefore Calling to Mind the Mortality of my Body and Know-
ing that it is appointed for all men Once to die do make my Last Will and Testament
in Manner and form following
First and principally I recommend my Soul to Almighty God Hoping to
be Saved by the Merits of my Blessed Saviour Jesus Christ and my
Body I bequeath to the Parish from whence it was taken to be buried in
a Christian and Decent Manner not Doubting but at the General
Resurrection I shall receive the same Again by the Mighty Power of
God
