In the Name of God amen I John Batlett being sick and weak but of sound memory and considering the frailty of this mortal life do make and Ordain this my last will and Testament in manner and form following - Imprimis I Commit my body to the Earth to be buried at the discretion of my Executors here after named and my Soul to the Mercy of God hoping through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ my Saviour to receive pardon and forgiveness of all my Sins and to be admitted into his heavenly Kingdom Next to the worldly Estate it hath pleased God to endue me with I give and bequeath in manner hereafter following -

Item I give to my daughter Elizabeth Negro Bess Nanny and Letty them and their Increase to her and her heirs for ever, I also give her one feather bed and furniture and one black mare called Dilly Black -

Item my will is that my wife live on any of my lands during her life or widowhood -

Item I give to my four Sons Lawrence Jonathan Thomas and George the Land I now live on to them and their heirs to be Equally Devised and in case one or more of them Should die before they Should come of Age that then it may be Equally Devised Between the surviving Brothers and that it be Devised when Lawrence comes of Age —

Item I give all my lands in Caroline County to my Son John Battell and his heirs but in case he should die Before he comes of Age then I give that to my Son Lawrence in due of his part of the land I now live on and the Land I now live on to be Equally divided amongst my other Two Sons or their Survivors —

Item I give all the rest of my Estate that is to say negroes and other Personal Estates what ever to be Equally Devised Between my Loving wife and five Sons John Lawrence Jonathan Thomas and George to them and their heirs and that it should be Devised when my Son John comes of Age and my wife is then Wallentine Morgan live on the Plantation whereon he now Lives Nineteen years he paying five hundred and Thirty Pounds of Tobacco Yearly after the Expiration of Two years and Lastly I appoint my Loving wife and my Son John and Jonathan Gibson my Executrix and Executors of this my Last will and Testament and I do hereby Revoke all other will and Testaments by me heretofore made In witness and Conformation whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal this 28<sup>th</sup> Day of November anno Domini 1744 —

Carpenter was not of disposing mind and memory at the time of making

Thirdly that he never Published this Writing to be his last Will & Testament

Rich<sup>r</sup> Burdine aged fifty years and upwards being sworn witness  
That on the fourth Day of October 1745 John Carpenter came to this  
Deponent where he was at Work and told him his Brother W<sup>m</sup> Carpenter was  
stricken with a Stroke or more and was very ill and had sent him to the Deponent  
for to come and write his Will on which the Deponent went to Thos<sup>r</sup> W<sup>m</sup> Carpenter  
and found him in great Pain appeared by his lights and features and could not sit  
long in one Place and was supported by his wife who was some time in the House  
several times out but chiefly out of the Room but chiefly by one Dr<sup>r</sup> Doctor  
who lived in Thos<sup>r</sup> William Carpenter's family and was requested his wife by Dr<sup>r</sup>  
Poyson that Deponent with that he very well believes Thos<sup>r</sup> W<sup>m</sup> Carpenter was in  
his Perfect Senses and at his request this Deponent wrote his will as he  
dictated from his own Mouth and he came to that Park where negro  
is Diversed to his Brother John and seeing that no Provision was made

for him this Depont. s<sup>d</sup> W<sup>r</sup> you must take notice as you are going to appear before  
 the God of all soules, do Justice to your own Flesh and Blood upon which after much  
 Consideration has my poor Brother John who has been with me in my Travels  
 & Distresses came into this Country with me I will give him a young Negro on which  
 Catharine Proctor said which must he have, the Depont said It was not Right  
 to set down the name of the Negro for fear her should die before the Estate was settled  
 on which W<sup>r</sup> Carpenter tol<sup>d</sup> him the Depont to set down a young Negro without naming  
 his name for his Brother John Carpenter, and thereupon this Depont wrote the  
 Deed relating to his Brother John Carpenter, this Depont saith that when Cath  
 Proctor spake to W<sup>r</sup> Carpenter to know which Negro John Carpenter was to have the  
 W<sup>r</sup> Carpenter seemed to be angry with her, and that after the will was wrote this Depont  
 Read the same to him, he said all was Right and then sealed and signed it and Declared  
 It to be his last Will and Testament, which is the same paper as is now produced in Court  
 and Desired this Depont to witness it which this Depont Did and at the  
 Request of theo<sup>d</sup> William Carpenter, called John Lloyd (the other Witness to theo<sup>d</sup> Will)  
 out of another Room and theo<sup>d</sup> Carpenter tol<sup>d</sup> him it was his last Will and thereupon  
 Lloyd did sign this Will as a Witness, that after the Will was signed he witnessed  
 this said William Carpenter tol<sup>d</sup> this Depont how Town Nicholas Young & Andrew  
 Gair his Esq<sup>r</sup> which the Depont Did at the Bottom of the Will, but does not remember  
 whether theo<sup>d</sup> John Lloyd was Present and theo<sup>d</sup> W<sup>r</sup> Carpenter Did not Publish again  
 after theo<sup>d</sup> was named, and afterwards William Carpenter asked what he meant  
 by this Depont for his Troubles who tol<sup>d</sup> him if he pleased he might give him  
 fifteen Pence and thereupon theo<sup>d</sup> Carpenter called for his purse which was brought  
 him by theo<sup>d</sup> Cath Proctor and looked out the heaviest Purse he had thought and  
 ask<sup>d</sup> the Depont if that would satisfy him who answered yes and took the Money

John Lloyd aged forty years or there abouts being soon with that he went

 hanging seeming to be very much Concerned at theo<sup>d</sup> Carpenter's Condition  
 and some time after he with several others were desired to go out of the Room  
 which they did leaving Catharine Proctor & Rich Burdine with him

the Mark he usually makes use of and that he does not know whether the  
Paper produced was the same he signed and that he had Drank ~~beer~~ at  
the Home but ..... was not Drunk neither does he the least Drunk  
and that this Deponent can't write and further with not <sup>any</sup>
