I William Atkins of the County of Pittsburgh
and State of Virginia being of sound mind
and in good health make my last will and
Testament in manner and form as follows.

I give to my son Henry Atkins and his heirs
forever the following land tract, begining in
~~any line adjoining where he now lives at the~~
fence and around the tract he is now in posse-
~~sion of to keep a part of my tract and have~~
~~full trac of the fence around to a pair of low~~
~~gate there up the path to the ridge path~~

leading from any house to Capt. Hopkins's land then
down a hollow to a branch in an old field and down
the branch to the creek thence up the same to the
spring that said Henry, formerly used, continuing
up said branch to my back line and along the same
~~to be~~^{beginning}

to my son Henry's new line and his land of
the following land toward; beginning at the same place
where Henry's new line is to begin thence along between
my son Henry and myself to the road leading ^{from} my
house to the Allynburg road, thence down said road
to, or near on, any old line near a field now used by my
daughter Sally Gibson, thence to the fence of the
said field and along said fence in to an old field and
inclosed until its corner opposite an old fence now
leading from some pines near the path and down
down said fence row to the head of a hollow and
down the same to the creek and up the creek to the
land herein before given to my son Henry and along
his line ^{to} the beginning.

3⁴, I give to my Daughter Sally Gibson and her heirs
forever the following land to wit, beginning at the fence
around the field in which she now lives where my son
Devers new line leaves the said fence and thence along
the fence to a line between her and my son William and
thence along the line and through the lower side of
an old field crossing the ridge road to trees I have choiced
as a line to Peeks old field and through the old field by
two marked trees on a ridge and so on to two marked trees
below the apple orchard on the branch thence up the same
and along my back line to the line herein before directed
to branch the land given to my daughter and along that
line to the begining.

~~the above to my daughter and her heirs~~
forever the land wherein he now lives it being all the
remaining part of my land on that side after

Creek not herein given to others.

It is my will and desire that Coleman Reynolds shall have and enjoy the said land and other property hereinafter mentioned for and during his life, and to his lawfully begotten children if he leave any sons in case he does not, then to my children herein before named and their heirs forever tow^t, I give under the limitations as aforesaid to said Coleman Reynolds who I hereby recognise as my son and henceforth desire that he shall be called Coleman Adkins the following land, to wit, beginning on the creek between John D. Mull and myself at the mouth of a branch thence along the north side of a cross fence running near a spring formerly used by Sally Reynolds and so on to the Woods and thence along a new chopped line to a branch above William Adkins spring and thence up said branch to a new chopped line and along said line to the ridge road and thence along said road and my back line to the land herein before

embefore given to my son Henry and thence down his line
to the creek and thence down the said creek to the beginning
6^{ly} It is my will and desire that my Executor hereinafter
appointed sell upon a credit of one and two years all the res-
idue of my land lying on the west side of Turkey Creek
creek and also upon a reasonable credit sell all the perish-
ble part of my estate.

7^{ly} I give to Lucy Smith one Hundred dollars and
I give to Betty Carter one Hundred dollars and I give to
Sally Gibson thirty dollars

8^{ly} I give to my son Coleman Adkins upon the terms
limitations and conditions contained and provided for
in the in the fifth clause of the will the following
property to wit; one negro girl named Sige and her
future increase and one horse bridle and saddle
worth sixty dollars. I also give him fifty dollars worth
of good and sufficient iron and steel of which I also give
him one half ton to be used for his own purposes
etc and if he continues to live without the
aid of others I give him fifteen barrels of corn and four

Hundred weight of Pork,

I give to my following Children to be equally divided between them and their heirs forever all the residue of my estate of every sort and kind, to-wit,
I give one sixth part to my daughter Lucy Smith,
one sixth part to Betsy Carter, one sixth part to Sally Gipson, one sixth part to my son George Atkin
one sixth part to William Atkins, and the other
sixth part to Owen Atkins, and lastly I do hereby
constitute and appoint my friend Vincent Fletcher
Executor to this my last will and Testament
hereby revoking all other or former wills by me
made written on two sheets and subscribed on the
sixth page this eighth day of April in the year
of our Lord 1847.

This last will and Testament of William Addkins deceased was presented in Court and proven by the oaths of A. H. Moormann and H. D. Moore two subscribing witnesses and ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of Vincent Watcher the Esquire in said will named who made oath and with A. H. Moormann & H. D. Moore his securities entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of ten thousand dollars conditioned according to law certificate was granted him for obtaining probate of said will in due form.
