

I Ann Woodson of Powhatan County do make this writing & ordain it to be my last Will and Testament in the following manner.

First. I give forever to my daughter Ann Cope, the following named slaves, Sall house, and her children Fortune Betty and Bob.

Second. I give forever to my daughter Sarah Woodson as followeth. Viz. The crop of every kind which may be raised on my plantation in the course of the year, certain household furniture now in the house, a list of which is lodged in the hands of Frederick Woodson it being all the household furniture purchased by me since the death of my husband; and four slaves to wit, James, Joe, Betty, and Rachel, and all my stock of Horses, neat Cattle hogs, Sheep.

Third. I give forever to my daughter Elizabeth Woodson, all my Plantation utensils, employed in the cultivation of the land.

Fourth. All my estate or property of every kind, not before given away by this Will, I give forever, to my three daughters, Sarah, Elizabeth and Mary, to be equally divided between them.

Lastly. I appoint to this my last Will and Testament, as executors Nathaniel Selden and Frederick Woodson, both of the County of Powhatan, hereby revoking all Wills or Testaments heretofore made by me.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twentieth day of April, in the year of Christ One thousand eight hundred and six.

when thereto required by the said Court, and further do well and
truly pay and deliver all the legacies contained and specified in the
said Will, as far as the said Goods, Chattels and Credits will extend
according to the value thereof, and as the law shall charge him.

and shall not commit
