

At a court held for Powhatan County the 19th day of
June 1805 This account of sales of the estate of
Rowland Conster dec^d was returned and ordered to
be recorded.

In the name of God amen. I Anthony Martin of
the County of Powhatan and Parish of King William
do make & ordain this my last Will & Testament, in
manner & form as follows.

Item, I give unto my beloved wife Jane Martin all
the Negroes that she was possessed of at our marriage
with all the increase of the said negroes since they
have been in my possession as also all the future
increase of said negroes from the date hereof, to her and
her heirs forever, I also give unto my said wife for
her support during her life the tract of land I live
upon, with all its appurtenances (the Mill excepted)
to work her own people) four horses, twenty head of
Cattle, thirty head of Hogs, all my Sheep and (all my)
Household & Kitchen ^{furniture} furniture (two feather beds furnished
with what household ^{furniture} brought with her be at her
own disposal), also one Ox Cart & Gear, and at the
death of my said wife the tract of Land with all
the other property (except what is left at her disposal)
left for the support of said wife be sold and the money
arising from the sale thereof be equally divided between
my Children, James Martin, Jane Whitworth, Sarah
Branch, & Margaret Dupuy and their heirs - I give

the said negroes both present & future to her & her heirs.

I give unto my Daughter Jane Whitworth all those negroes I have put in her possession since the death of her husband Samuel Branch with all the increase of the said negroes both present & future to her & her heirs (the negroes given to my daughter Jane while she was the wife of Samuel Branch are inventoried as the Est of said Samuel Branch dec^d.)

I also give unto my said daughter Jane Whitworth the land I purchased of the Baileys, containing by estimation three hundred & twelve acres be the same more or less to her & her heirs forever.

I give unto my daughter Sarah Branch one hundred acres of land part of a tract I purchased of Henry Randolph, to her, and her heirs forever.

I also give unto my said daughter Sarah all those negroes I have put in her possession with all the increase of the said negroes both present and future to her & her heirs.

I give unto my daughter Margaret Dupuy all those Negroes that I have put in her possession with all the increase of the said negroes both present & future to her & her heirs.

Further it is my will, that my wife should be supported out of my estate from the time of my death until a Disp can be made by her own people - it is also my will, that all the Estate I possess at my death not already given, in this Will, (after my just debts are paid) be equally divided between my Children James Martin, Jane Whitworth, Sarah Branch & Margaret Dupuy, & their heirs.

Whereas I have paid for the husbands of my afore daughters the sum of six hundred and ninety pounds - that is to say Ninety pounds for

Samuel Branch dec. Two hundred pounds for
 William Branch & four hundred pounds for Peter
 Dupuy. I think I have divided my estate with
 as much equity as I could do conveniently, and
 lastly I do appoint my son James Martin and
 my sons in law Thomas Whitworth, William
 Branch & Peter Dupuy executors of this my last
 Will & Testament written with my own hand
 and dated this second day of August, one thousand
 eight hundred. In testimony whereof I hereunto set
 my hand & seals.

At a Court held for Powhatan County the
 19th day of June 1805. This last Will and Testament
 of Anthony Martin dec. was presented in Court and
 proven by the oath of Joseph Holman one of the
 subscribing witnesses, and the hand writing of the
 said deceased ~~was~~ also proved by the oaths of David
 Flounoy, and Aaron Flounoy, and thereupon ordered
 to be recorded. And on the motion of Thomas Whitworth,
 Wm Branch and Peter Dupuy, three of the executors
 named in the said Will, certificate is granted them
 for obtaining probat thereof in due form, they having
 made oath and entered into bond with security as
 the law directs.
