H. Owen, Gregher Owen, and Lope Owen - and that my
land and all the remainder part of my estate be sold as
my executors may direct and the money arising therefrom
first, to be applied to the discharging of all my just
debts and the balance be equally divided among all
my children above named. I Nominate to this my
last Will, as executors my trusty friends Chancellor St.
Lawrence, Frederick Woodson Joseph Mayo.
