In the name of God amen, I Henry Macon of Powhatan
County being in good health & perfect understanding & not know-
ing how soon it may please the Superior being to call me hence do
make this my last will and testament: I give unto my
loving mother all my stock of every description also my household
and kitchen furniture. Secondly, I give to my loving sister Mary
Michaux two Negroes Daniel and Penny. Thirdly I give to my
loving sister Rebecca Mayo Red one Negro named Charles & two
mules and one hundred acres of land adjoining the lands of
Mr. Hughes Woodson's Estate, Mr. Self and Conway. Fourthly, I
give unto my loving sister Sally Woodson Swann two Negroes
named Archer and Ruben also two hundred acres of land ad-
joining that I gave sister Rebecca so as to take in the dwelling house
& its appurtenances together with the plantation utensils. Fifthly
it is my desire that my mother ^{mill} give my loving sister Ann Macon
abbe with her present and future increase. Sixthly I give to my
little niece Elizabeth Henry Kidd a horse colt generally called the
Stranger. Seventhly, I give unto my loving nephew George Taylor
Henry Swann and Elizabeth Henry Kidd the balance of my land-
ed Estate not herein given. It is my wish that my Clothes shall
be equally given to my three brother-in-law Richard
Michaux Thomas Thompson Swann and Thomas Kidd.

(together with my books) I further desire that my two faithful slaves Old Matt & Lott shall be free & a maintenance of ten dollars be given them accordingly with provision also. Lastly, I constitute & appoint my two friends Thomas Thompson Swann & Maj. Joseph Mayo my Executors to this my last will: as witness my hand & seal this twenty seventh day of June, Anno Domini 1809

At a Court held for Powhatan County on the 18th day of October 1809, this last will and testament of Henry Macon deceased was presented in Court and proven by the oaths of John P Woodson and George W Redd both of the subscribing Witnesses thereto, and was ordered to be recorded. On the motion of Joseph Mayo one of the executors therein named a certificate is granted him of having obtained probate thereof in due form, he having made oth and entered into bond with security as the law directs.
