

In the name of God amen. I Jacob Williamson of the County of Powhatan, being of sound mind and memory, but considering the uncertainty of this transitory life, do make publish and declares this my last will and testament in manner and form following, to wit.

Item I give and bequeath unto my grand daughter Mary Francis Anderson, to her and her heirs forever a negro girl by the name Honardtha the daughter of Eas.

Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah Anderson, to her and her heirs forever, the six following slaves with their increase to wit, Eas, Honey, Pat, Ben, Bob and Sucky, I also give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah Anderson, to her and her heirs forever, my tract of land known by the name of Barnes to be bounded on the East by Headfathers Creek beginning at Richard Cuthberts corner from thence down the said Headfathers creek according to the meanders as it now runs into Little deep Creek thence down the said Little deep Creek to William Smiths corner tree.

Item I give to my daughter Frances Williamson, to her and her heirs forever all the remainder of my land in Powhatan County being the plantation whereon I now live, and bounded on the west by the land given my daughter Sarah, I also give my daughter Frances Williamson, to her and her heirs forever, the three following slaves with their increase, Ford, Fredrick, Rachel and Matilda also all my household and kitchen furniture reserving the use of all the said furniture to my wife ~~during~~ during her widowhood.

Item I give unto my wife Mary Williamson during her widowhood all the remainder of my estate of every kind whatsoever not before disposed of including my land in Amelia County, which said land is bounded

Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah
 and her heirs forever, the six following slaves
 with their increase to wit, Eda, Henry, Sally, Ben, Bob
 and Tucker, I also give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah
 and her heirs forever, my tract of land
 known by the name of Barnes to be bounded on the
 East by Hoodsfoot's Creek beginning at Richard's corner
 corner from thence down the said Hoodsfoot's Creek ac-
 cording to the meanders as it now runs into Little
 deep Creek, thence down the said Little deep Creek to
 William Smith's corner tree.

Item I give to my daughter Frances Williamson, to
 her and her heirs forever all the remainder of my land
 in Powhatan County, being the plantation whereon I now live,
 and bounded on the West by the land given my daughter
 Sarah, I also give my daughter Frances Williamson, to
 her and her heirs forever, the three following slaves with
 their increase, David, Frederick, Rachel and Matilda,
 also all my household and kitchen furniture reserving
 the use of all the said furniture to my wife ~~during~~ during
 her widowhood.

Item I give unto my wife Mary Williamson during
 her widowhood all the remainder of my estate of every
 kind whatsoever not before disposed of, including my
 land in Amelia County, which said land in Amelia
 County, my said wife Mary is to dispose of in any
 manner she may think proper, and my will and desire
 is that my wife Mary keep peaceable and just possession
 of the lands given my two daughters Sarah and Frances
 during her widowhood, and lastly I do hereby appoint
 my wife Mary Williamson executrix to this my last
 will and testament and to act as such without giving
 security in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my
 hand and affixed my seal this twenty eighth day of

July, One thousand eight hundred and eight

At a court held for Powhatan County the 15th day of March 1809. This last Will and Testament of Jacob Williamson dec^d was presented in court and proved by the oath of Hughes Owen a subscribing witness thereto and the handwriting of David Owen dec^d who was another subscribing witness was proved by the oaths of Hughes Owen, George Owen and Jacob N. Carozo and the will thereupon admitted to record. - And at a court held for the aforesaid County, on the 19th day of April 1809 on the motion of Mary Williamson the executrix named on the said will who made oath thereto as the law requires, Certificate is granted her for obtaining probat thereof in due form no bond or security being required by the said testator. - The said will having first been further proved by the oath of Richard Crump a subscribing witness thereto. KNOW all men by these presents that we Hugh French and Robert Myrdum are held and firmly bound unto John Tyler Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia for the time being, in the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars to be paid to the said Governor or his successors for the use of the Commonwealth to which payment we bind ourselves our heirs executors or jointly and severally firmly by these presents sealed with our seals and dated this 19th day of April Anno Domini 1809.
