I Mary Hughes of the County of Powhatan, and State of Virginia, considering the uncertainty of human life, and feeling it my duty to dispose of those goods and effects, which it has pleased God to bestow on me in the manner hereafter mentioned—

1st It is my wish and desire that all my just debts be paid by my Executors hereafter named in the following manner. I wish my crop of Tobacco, Corn and Wheat, Stock of all kinds, household and kitchen furniture (except those hereafter particularly devised), to be sold in such manner and way as my Executors may think most to the advantage of my Estate and at the same time, doing that Justice to my creditors in the same manner as if they were placed in my situation—

2nd I give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Logwood my feather Bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever—

- Item 3^d I give and bequeath unto Nancy Baugh, Ten dollars to be paid her out of my estate by my Executors -
- Item 4th I give and bequeath unto my three Grand Children, Robert Hughes Barr, Mary Goode, and Sally Bland Goode one feather Bed and furniture to each of them and to their heirs forever -
- Item 5th I give and bequeath unto my daughter, Sally Goode, one Saddle Horse (generally, called Jack sored) to her and her heirs forever -
- Item 6th It is my Will and desire, that after my just debts are paid or on or before the 25th of December 1805, that my negro Woman named Lucy should have her freedom, and that my Executors take such proceedings in Court as to have her completely emancipated at that period agreeable to the Laws of the State -
- Item 7th I lend unto my Grand daughter, Mary Goode, a negro boy named Powhatan County Wills 1796-1806
Montgomery. I lend unto my Grand daughter, Sally, Bland Goode a Negro Girl named Rosena - I lend unto my Grand daughter, Betsey Goode a negro, Girl named Nelly. I lend unto my Grandson Robert Hughes, Barrington, a negro boy named Phill, for each of their benefits, and use until the period hereafter mentioned
- Item 8th It is my Will and desire, that the four children of Lucys trust, a Negro Boy named Montgomery, at present Eleven years old - a Negro Girl named Rosena, at present Seven years old - a negro Girl named Nelly at present five years old, and a Negro boy named Phill, at present three years old they and each of them to have their freedom when they respectively shall arrive at the age of Twenty five years and that my Executors, take such proceedings, in Court as they shall respectively arrive at that age of twenty five as aforesaid as to have them completely emancipated, or set free agreeable to Law without delay -

Item 6 I give and bequeath unto my wife (generally, called Jack sonnet) to her and her heirs forever

Item 7th It is my Will and desire, that after my just debts are paid or on or before the 25th of December 1805, that my negroe Woman named Lucy should have her freedom, and that my Executors take such proceedings in Court as to have her completely emancipated at that period agreeable to the Laws of the State -

Item 7th I lend unto my grand daughter, Mary Goode, a negroe boy named Montgomery. I lend unto my grand daughter, Sally Bland Goode a Negroe Girl named Rosena - I Lend unto my grand daughter, Betsy Goode, a negroe, Girl named Nelly. Item 9th I give and bequeath unto my four grand children Robert Hughes, Carrington, Mary Goode, Sally Bland Goode, and Betsy Goode, all the balance of my Estate, after paying my just debts and the specific Legacies ~~before~~ mentioned to them and their heirs forever - and should either of my Grand children depart this life before they become of

Lawfull age or marry, that their proportion of the Estate above devised shall go to the survivors and to their heirs -

Lastly, I do hereby appoint and leave as my Executors to this my last will and testament (revoking all others) my Brother Littleberry Mosby, and my friends Josiah Smith, John Daniel and Benjamin Harrington -

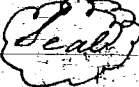
