County, being at this time in a weak near to my great and final change
(and anxious to secure the Peace and happiness of my family, in
all my going, do declare this as my last will and Testament, desiring
every other heretofore written.

After recommending my soul to the Mercy and grace of that God
who gave it, I give my Estate to be divided amongst my family in the
following manner. To my
lawful wife Mary Barber I give the house and plantation
which I now dwell in, and is known by the name of the ^{great} plantation
and as well make it up six hundred acres to be taken off from
my land adjoining it, taking it from the best part of that land
I likewise leave to her for her use during her natural life
and to be at her disposal amongst my children at her death
the one third part of my personal Estate and whatever may
remain after the division hereby directed to be made among

of my family - and upon and among
witness, I declare it my will, that my Estate hereby Wille, except
what is already given to my son Judson Parker and my Daughter
Jane Davis - ~~and~~ Mary W. Parker shall be kept together, for the
Benefit of ~~me~~ which until any of the others shall come of age or marry,
and that in such a Case, after dividing it as is hereafter directed, the
Remainder shall be kept together until some of the rest come of age or marry,
And so on till all be divided.

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I give and bequeath to my son Judson Parker and to my Daughter Jane
Davis - ~~and~~ Mary W. Parker that part of my Estate which they
are now in possession of -

I give and bequeath to my son William F. Parker the tract of land
which I purchased of Gabriel Smith lying on the Branches of Mobern
over and above his parts hereafter expressed.

I give and bequeath to my son John, and already expressed as last
to my wife -

I give and bequeath to my sons William F. and Thomas, the Rem of my
Land - to be divided between at the Discretion of my Executors.

I give and bequeath to my sons William F. and Thomas and to his
and to each of his Daughters Elizabeth, Fannie, Frances, Louisa and Mary and

And I give and bequeath to each of my sons William & Thomas my share
and to each of my daughters Elizabeth, Jane, Frances, Anne & Mary and
about of my estate, or in the Opinion of my Executors shall be equal
to that which I have given my son Isaac and my daughter Daughters
after deducting my wife's part and paying my debts.

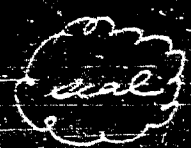
But if there shall not be sufficient Estate in such part, then
the Children last named shall have an equal part with one another
of the Remainder, at the discretion of my Executors, without making
any Apportionment.

Lastly I hereby appointing my loving wife Mary Barker, Executor, and Mr.
Thomas Plummer, with Capt. Jacob Hays, Isaac Barker and William
H. Barker Executors of this my last Will and Testament. Signed this 24th

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At a Court held for Prince Edward County October 2nd 1785. This last Will and Testament of William Parker deceased, was presented in Court and proved by two of the Witnesses thereto, and Ordered to be Recorded. On the motion of Henry Parker, Thomas Homanay, Jacob Morton and William Parker four of the Executors therein named who gave bond and took the Oath required by Law Certificate for obtaining a probat thereof in due form is granted them, and leave for the other Executors to take Execution thereof at another day.
