Have given granted and confirmed, and by these presents, do give grant and
confirm unto my said Grandson William Haynes and to his heirs for ever, three
Negro Slaves to wit, Unice Sam and Coffey, with the future issue or increase
of the said Unice, reserving however the use Labour and service of said Negro and
of the issue or increase of the said Unice to myself for and during my natural life
To have and to hold the said Negro Unice, Sam and Coffey, with the future
issue or increase of the said Unice unto him my said Grandson William Haynes
and to his heirs forever, reserving the use, labour and service of them to myself for
and during my natural life as aforesaid. In Witness whereof I have here-
unto set my hand & Seal this thirteenth day of February in the year of our

Whereas Elizabeth Walke and Ann Fisher each of the County of
+ Prince Anne, are indebted to James Boye of the Borough of Norfolk
in the sum of fifteen hundred and fifty Spanish milled Dollars which sum
they are desirous to secure the payment of unto the said James Boye, and
for that purpose have agreed to convey and assign unto Thomas Newton Sen^r of
the Borough of Norfolk the lands and tenements and the Slaves hereinafter
words to be specified & designated, upon trust and for that purposes hereinafter
expressed, by these presents. Now this Indenture made this twenty ninth
day of April in the year Christ one thousand eight hundred and two Between
the said Elizabeth Walke and Ann Fisher of the one part, the said James
Boye of the other part and the said Thomas Newton who is chosen who is chosen
Trustee by the other parties for the purposes hereafter to be declared, Witnesseth
that the said Elizabeth Walke and Ann Fisher in consideration of the circum-
stances before recited and of the sum of one dollar to them paid by the said
Thomas Newton of which sum they admit twenty the rest have given granted
conferred and confirmed unto the said Thomas Newton the following property
viz: one tract of Land lying on the southern side of the eastern branch of Elizabeth
River nearly opposite Newtown and commonly known by the name of Woodstock
Also a Tract of Land about twenty chains (by survey) to the southward of said
Woodstock Plantation, both tracts together containing in all one hundred
and ninety eight acres and a half, by estate survey of the County Surveyor
of Prince Anne, Also eight Negroes whose names follows, George, Mary, Jackson
Hannah Archibald, Charity, Alphouse, Davy and John, which eight Negroes were
