In the Name of God Amen I James Smith being very sick & knowing not how soon it may please God to take me out of this world I make this my last will & Testament in manner as followeth first I bequeath my soul into God's hands of almighty God that gave it hoping that at the resurrection to receive a full pardon for all my former sins & for my worldly Estate I give as followeth I give & bequeath unto my brother John Smith a certain parcel of Land which I bought of my brother Bartholomew Bond to him his heirs & on his hand mill & on his horse & on his gun & three head of cattle I give unto my brother's son James Smith one parcel of Land which I bought of Joseph Coper to him his heirs for ever. I give unto my sister Mary bond one bed & furniture & on a pet & on a parson dish & on a parson's chest & box & two Earthen pots and I do assign my brother John Smith my hole & sole Exor of this my last will and Testament as witness my hand & seals this 31 day of August 1730 James Smith
