

Princes Anne County, February the 21: 1721: In the Name of God Amen. I John Bonney
son being very sick & weak of body but of perfect & disposing mind & memory praised
be almighty God Do make ordain & appoint this my last will & Testament in manner
& form following / Ver: — Imp: I give & bequeath my soul into hands of almighty
God hoping to be saved through his merits of Jesus Christ my ever blessed redeemer &
my body to the ground to lie decently buried at the discretion of my executors after
removal which all my debts & funeral charges be contented & paid —

Item: I give & bequeath to my loving wife Mary Bonney all & every of goods and
chattels which I had by her out of the estate of my predeceſſor John Danley &c: and one
young breeding mare with her foal & her brass also I give her one of feather bed & fur
niture such as belongeth to it during her naturall life: also I give wife my said wife
of two pound Cash in m^t Thomas Walker's hands & five pounds in her possesſion Cash
also I likewise give to my said wife 4 uſs of one young negro wench called Hobie for
two old months by that time. If so she may purchase another — It: I give to my
daughter Mary Gorrie all that she had in possesſion I likewise give to my said Daughter
one negro boy called Sam: to her & her heirs for ever also one hundred Chester fl I give &
bequeath unto my daughter Frances Bonney the above named negro wench Hobie
& her increase to her & her heirs for ever & also give her one feather bed She has in
possesſion two Iron pots one for gallons & one about three gallons. one small
Table & four plant bottoms chairs & two chests one large one & one small & brads
muster & port hole & smoothing Iron; — Item I give & bequeath to Frances my daughter
one tract of plantation of land being the north end of Long Island beginning on
the East Side of said Island at an old fence made by Dennis Cross & so along of said
fence to the western end being eighty acres more or less to her & the heirs of
her body begotten — It: I give all my Cattle to my three children John Bonney Mary
Gorrie & Frances Bonney to be Equally divided amongst them; — It: I give my power
to be divided between my Son John & daughter Frances Bonney as Equally as they can
do it & all my Sheep between them likewise — It: I give & bequeath to my Son John
Bonney two plantations containing two hundred acres or thereabouts more or less. being
the second whereon he now liveth & the remainder part of Long Island that belongeth to me
one negro man & negro woman called Hector & Rose the land & said negro to him & his
heirs for ever —

 five pound Cash in my Thomas Walker's hands & five pounds in her possesyon Cash
 also I likewise give to my said wife & use of our young negro wench called Alice for
 twelve months by that time I hope to have purhased another in it. I give to my
 daughter Mary Gornto all that she has in possession I likewise give to my said Daughter
 one negro boy called Sam to her & her heire for ever also one small Chest in it I give to
 Bequwath unto my daughter Frances Bonney the above named negro wench & bo
 ther in excess to her her heire for ever I also give her one feather bed She has in
 possession two Iron pots one Ton gallons & one about three gallons. one small
 Table & four plant bottom chairs & two chests one large one small & a
 monster 4 post bed & smoothing Iron; — Item I give to Bequwath to Frances my Daugh
 ter one tract plantation of Land being the north end of Long Island begining on
 East Side of said Island at an old fence made by Dennis Cross & soe along said
 fence to the western landing being eighty acres more or less to her & the heires of
 her body together. — It. I give all my Cattle to my three children John Bonney Mary
 Gornto & Frances Bonney to be Equally divided amongst them; — It I give my power
 to be divided between my Son John & daughter Frances Bonney as Equally as they can
 do it & all my Sheep both men & women likewise — It I give to Bequwath to my Son John
 Bonney two plantations containing two hundred acres or thereabouts more or less being
 the division whereon he now lies & the remainder part of Long Island that belongeth to me
 one negro man & negro woman called Doctor & his land & said negroes to him & his
 heires for ever; — Lastly as for the rest of my estate both personal & real I give to
 my Son John Bonney appointing him sole Executor of this my last will & Testament
 revoking & disannulling all other wills & Testaments by me formerly made In witness
 whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal the day and year above written —
