 Now my Will is that my ^{whole} estate to remain in my Wife Mary Lucsenberry possession her life and here the 1/2 of it as she bears after my debts is paid and after her 1/2 is paid to be equally divided between My Daughter Mary Thomas and my Wife and the 1/2 of the 1/2 of it as she bears after my debts is paid
