To the Worshipful Court of Botetourt County

The first part of my previous statement shows the condition of the account of Thomas H. Davis as guardian of the infant heirs of Andrew Marshall, deceased. Each statement showing the balance due to the same with whom the account is stated, except the commission to which the guardian is entitled for collecting the same. The first statement, viz., that with Justice P. Marshall only, shows the amount of commission to which the guardian will be entitled out of the legacy of that man. It is proper however that it should be noted that the balances shown by these statements do not carry interest, although interest is now incoming (but not collectable) upon balances which form part of such balance. The second statement for Justice Price is made because it is proper to charge the guardian with the interest as it becomes payable, and to credit each legatee with his equal proportion of it. No future calculations of interest in favor of the same can therefore be taken to deduct from the last statement, the values of the negroes which form part of those balances. Respectfully submitted

Within six hours on Saturday morn and p.m. it is my will that my wife shall have the privilege of choosing from all the stock and household furniture I may then at the time of my decease the above mentioned stock and furniture. I also give to my wife and her heirs forever such farming utensils kitchen ware, living house ware and chamber fixtures as my Executrix shall think necessary for the time past and convenience of her family. I also give to my wife my two slaves and desire her to leave them to some person that she thinks will keep them together. As they were inseparable from coming to this country together.  
And in case my aforesaid wife shall die before I do then and in that case I give the property I have given to her and her heirs given to the following persons to wit I give the lands I bought of J. C. Clegg to his brother James Clegg and his heirs forever provided he will pay to Joshua, J. Holmes, James C. Holmes, John Holmes, William Holmes, Gilson & Holmes one hundred dollars each, and the heirs of James Miller who formerly gave Holmes one hundred dollars and also pay to James Clegg, Emily Clegg, Henry Clegg, Ammon Clegg, Mr. Dan Clegg, John A. Clegg, Culian J. Clegg, Luanas J. Clegg, Mary Clegg, Maria J. Clegg, Agustus A. Clegg and Anna Clegg the children of Eveline Clegg, each two hundred and twenty five dollars and the stock, household and kitchen furniture to be equally divided between the four daughters of Henry Gauthier (viz) Peggy Allison, Bettina, Phoebe & Sophie Gauthier and also wish my wife to take my little black boy Charlie and keep him as long as she lives and then he is to live with which ever of my legatees he may choose without their paying anything further more than to clothe him & not pay any expenses he may be to them.  
9<sup>th</sup> I give the lands I own in the upper end of Cypress Valley known as the Bluff tract to George & Conner and his wife during their lives and at their death to their children.  
10<sup>th</sup> I give to the children of Jefferson R. Tugate, Bartman Gathen, and Joseph Shaffer and also Gauthier son of Henry Gauthier joint executors of my testate and other slaves of mine the same to be divided in following manner (viz viz) The children of Jefferson R. Tugate to have one fourth part, the children of Bartman Gathen to have one fourth part, the children of Joseph Shaffer to have one fourth part and Henry Gauthier if to have the other fourth part.  
11<sup>th</sup> I give to the children of John Stoye the lands & houses in the town of Americus which is to be sold to them at two thousand dollars.

12<sup>th</sup> I give to the children of Bartman Gathen my plantation on which John Black pine trees known as Henry Gathen which is to be rated to them at one hundred dollars.  
13<sup>th</sup> I give to John Gonaker son of Henry Gonaker or at the death of my wife the plantation exculde the house and any slaves appertaining thereto and if the 1<sup>st</sup> John Gonaker should die within 12 months than his next oldest Brother to have it, which place I want to have a ten thousand five hundred dollars.  
14<sup>th</sup> I wish my Executrix to remove the land I have given to my wife in her favor and the lumber given to the children of Bartman Gathen until my wife's decease and that they shall not be alienated & wish them to be farmed according to the usual mode of farming in this country that is to be kept up gratis at least four years one of every six.  
I wish them also to dispose of all my personal property not herein left disposed of either than the slaves to the best advantage; either publicly or privately as they may chuse. And as I desire that my slaves after my decease may find into the power of good masters & masters that my Executrix may allow them to choose their own masters and if they choose any person who is unwilling to give the amount they are appertaining I wish they the Executrix reduce the amount till they take off on this part, and set in such credit or credits as they may think proper and I desire in any case that the 2<sup>d</sup> slave may to sell to whom ever they desire to go to and I wish them to be sold as much as families as I possibly the master choosing for their own children who under 18 years of age.  
When the Executrix have sold the property and collected the money and paid all just debts and expenses then I wish them to return money enough in their hands to pay all expenses of taking care of my old black swammin during his life.  
I desire my Executrix to hold this money in their hands or leave it out as they may think best and pay to the children as they come of age so as that each ones children may receive as much as another and the same to be given to any of them to men than their share they are to pay to the other as I wish my slaves that I have given to J. R. Tugate, Bartman Gathen and John Gonaker and my other property to be equally divided in four parts and each part to be divided so as each ones children may have equally except the little boy of J. R. Tugate who is crippled whose name is Henry. I wish him to have as much as either two of brothers or sisters.  
The slaves I have herein given to my wife during her life I wish to be disposed of at her death in the same way as I have directed for my other slaves to dispose of.

I desire that the following Gentlemen be appointed to appraise my property (viz) Robert D. Martin, Anthony Evans, James McClellan, Robert Gathen.

I desire the following gentlemen may be my Executrix (viz) John D. Baskanta, John S. Dugger, Charles L. Fox and John C. Gathen.
