 I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Rachel B. Honaker for and during her natural life, all my estate, real and personal and mixed (with the exception of some special legacies here after named).
 At her death I give and bequeath the said estate (with the exception of the aforesaid legacies) real personal and mixed to be equally divided among my children, Mary E. Honaker, Edith Graham (formerly Edith Honaker), James B. Honaker

William H. Honaker, Rachel & Honaker, Elbert S. Honaker and Bettie Honaker. I give nothing to my daughter Sarah or my son Samuel P. Honaker because I have heretofore given to my said daughter all that I intended she shall have from my Estate, nor do I give anything to my son Samuel P. Honaker, he having been provided in the will of my uncle Henry Honaker.

It is, therefore my desire that my said daughter Sarah and son Samuel have no part or share of my Estate, except that my wife Rachel may give to the said Samuel, whenever he may need the same such stock, implement and furniture as she may think proper. And if the said Samuel shall except and receive the same he is to pay the expenses of a thorough collegiate education for my son Elbert, if he does not do so then he is to pay the value of the articles he receives to be applied to the education of the said Elbert.

Item, I have given to my daughter Mary E. Honaker a tract of land, for which I paid three hundred dollars, which is to be accounted for by her as so much of her share in the general distribution, and I do hereby will and direct that each of my children Edith, James William, Rachel, Elbert, and Bettie may have a like sum of three hundred dollars whenever they may marry or become of age, and whatever advancements I may hereafter make to any of my children, in my life time shall be accounted for by them as so much of their distributive share.

Item, It is my will and desire that each of my sons James William and Elbert shall have a regular collegiate education and my two daughters Edith and Bettie shall each be well educated, for that purpose I give and bequeath all monies or bonds which I may have at my decease, to be so applied and whatever may be wanting from that fund to be supplied from the bulk of my Estate.

Item, As I gave to my daughter Sarah on her marriage certain stock and furniture, I hereby will and direct that my children Mary, Edith, James William, Rachel, Elbert, and Bettie on their marriage or becoming of age shall each have one horse, two cows, ten sheep and two beds and furniture to be accounted for in the

general distribution of my Estate.

Item, I hereby appoint my said wife Rachel Honaker sole executrix of this my last will and testament, and as I have every confidence in her prudence and economy, it is my will and desire she shall not be required to give bond and security for the same.
