

Eaton to four hundred Dollars to Samu Eaton, and four hundred dollars to Elizabeth Williams, and four hundred dollars to Susan Hammon and four hundred dollars to John Scott and the said Edward Eaton is further required to take care of, and support my wife during her natural life and he is to let her have a Room to herself in the old mansion house, and if she requires it, the Kitchen also is to be for her use.

Lastly, I direct that all the money, that my Executors may collect from my debtors, or that may come into their hands from the sale of the property devised by me to be sold, after paying off specific legacies, be equally divided amongst my brothers and sisters, and my brothers in law and sisters in law being after named (Nancy Scott children and part of Richard Eatons children as hereinafter named to be also taken into the account), To wit: Joseph Eaton John Eaton, Edward Eaton David Eaton, Samu Eaton John Scott, Elizabeth Williams Susan Hammon, and the children of Nancy Scott collectively to be taken as one legatee, and the children of Richard Eaton, William F Eaton excepted) collectively, to be counted as one legatee the names of Richard Eatons children to whom this devise is made are Wiley S Eaton Mary Jo Williamson Joseph R Eatons Polina Eaton Emeline S Eaton and Lucina Eaton, the names of Nancy Scotts children are not known.

Ninthly, My Executors will find amongst my papers a bond on Samuel Scott for about thirty Dollars, this bond is to be canceled, and given up to him Tenth and Lastly, I constitute and appoint John Leadballe and Joseph Eaton my Executors of this my last Will and Testament.

Virginia. At a Court held for the County of Pulaski the 8th day of April 1838.

The last Will and Testament, and also a Codicil, thereto, of Crozier Eaton deceased, was presented in Court, proven by John S Howe and John M Hoge subscribing witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of John Leadballe and Joseph Eaton the Executors named in said Will and together with Edward Halson John S Howe John Trolinger and Charles Owens as their Securities, entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of Twenty five thousand dollars with such conditions as the law requires, and having qualified according to law, certificate is granted them for obtaining a probate of said Will in due form.

In Court I, John W. Carnahan of the County of Pulaski and State of Virginia do make, certify and declare this instrument to be my last Will and Testament.

To my daughter, Isabella E. Carnahan I will and bequeath the sum of Fifty thousand Dollars (\$50,000) also to my daughter Mary Ann Carnahan the like sum of fifteen thousand Dollars (\$1500) I also bequeath to my daughter Isabella E. Carnahan, & Mary Ann Carnahan jointly all my personal property, money & debts, that may be due me at my death.

It is my wish and desire that my Executors shall sell my real estate, on a credit of from one to four years, or for less, as they may judge most advisable, and to pay out of the proceeds of the sale, the above mentioned legacies and the residue, I desire shall be divided equally between my sons Thos. S. William B. Samuel W. & John W. Carnahan.

I hereby constitute and appoint Thos. S. Carnahan Samuel W. Carnahan Executors of this my last Will & Testament who it is my wish shall administer without giving security. In witness of all things herein contained I have set my hand and seal this 20th day of Jan 1838.
