I John Payer of the City of Richmond do make and  
 confirm this writing as and for my last will and  
 testament hereby expressly revoking all other wills  
 and testaments heretofore made by me.

Whereas under a well founded impression and  
 confident belief that my late wife, Ann Payer had  
 departed this life, I have intermarried with Elizabeth  
 James, who alone is acknowledged by me as my wife,  
 none other having any just claim upon me or  
 my estate in that character.

I do will and direct as follows, Inpamio: I will  
 my estate that my executor herein after named  
 do, within convenient time after my decease,  
 sell at public auction upon such terms and con-  
 ditions and on such mode as he may think best  
 calculated to enhance its price, all my estate  
 real and personal except as hereinafter excepted  
 and bequeathed.

After payment of my funeral expenses and just  
 debts, I give and bequeath my estate as follows:

To my wife Elizabeth Payer, all my household  
 kitchen furniture, except my organ and secretary.  
 I also give her one thousand dollars in money,  
 and these bequests are in lieu of dower.

To my executor herein after named I give and  
 receive his bond to me for seven hundred and fifty  
 dollars, payable on the first of January 1856, also  
 his other bond for five hundred dollars, payable  
 on the 1 of January 1857, which bonds were given  
 for part of the purchase money for Saymarket or

Had Meisen. The other bonds of said executor given for  
 the same consideration and payable 1 January 1857  
 1 January 1854 and 1 January 1855 are not released  
 and form part of my estate.

I give and bequeath to my niece Ann Tinely two hun-  
 dred dollars, and to my niece Elizabeth Richardson  
 and Louisa Bayan one hundred dollars each, to my  
 niece Elizabeth Taylor three hundred dollars, and to  
 her sister Rebecca Taylor one hundred dollars. I  
 also give to my niece Charlotte Allison of Williams  
 burg three hundred dollars, to my niece Elizabeth  
 Jones one hundred dollars, to my natural son Edwin  
 Taylor, if he be living five hundred dollars, to my  
 nephew Thomas Quarles one hundred dollars, to my  
 friend Lewis Burwell, and his daughter Mary one  
 hundred dollars each. All the rest and residue of my  
 estate, that is to say of the monies arising from the sale  
 thereof, I give to my nephews Archer Bankins, William  
 Bankins, Robert Bankins, John Bankins and Payer  
 Bankins, to be equally divided between them.

To said Robert P. Richardson I give my secretary. I  
 hereby constitute and appoint my friend A. P. Upshur  
 my executor and desire that no security be demanded  
 of or of him.

1<sup>st</sup> I give and bequeath unto Miss Frances Burwell,  
 three hundred dollars. 2<sup>d</sup> I give and bequeath unto  
 Mrs. Louisa Tinely two hundred dollars. 3<sup>d</sup> I give and  
 bequeath unto Mrs. Sarah Leonard one hundred dollars  
 all to be paid out of my residuary estate.

At a court of Auctions held for the City of Richmond  
 the 11<sup>th</sup> day of January 1853, the last

will and testament of John Poyor deceased was proved by the oath of John S. Stricker and Phillip M. Salt. Executors thereof, and together with the several thereto annexed which was proved by the oath of Peter P. Mayo a witness to the same, & was to be recorded. And on the motion of Philip P. Upshur the executor in the said will named, who made oath thereto and entered into and acknowledged his bond in the penalty of Twelve Thousand dollars conditioned as the law directs (but without security, the will directing that none should be required of him) certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate of the said will and codicil in due form.

In the name of God Amen. I Richard Guthrie of the County of Pulaski and State of Virginia, do to the uncertainty of life and now being in sound mind and memory, beseech be almighty God for the same. I now constitute and ordain this my last will and testament in manner and form following:

I first order all my just debts paid if there be any, and funeral expences. I then give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Elizabeth Guthrie all my household and kitchen furniture and the two rooms including the kitchen we now occupy, and likewise my black woman Jane to keep or dispose of as she may think proper, and black girl Harriet, to be at her command during his natural life, likewise my black boy Joe the same. I likewise give to my beloved wife as much of the land

benefit during his natural life. After my beloved wife decease I order the said land and all his offspring except his eldest daughter Luiza, to be sold, and my desire is that she have liberty to chuse his master not out of reach of his husband, or the neighborhood, if such a purchaser can be found had, to give his value, the money equally divided between my five daughters, that is Elizabeth Stone, Leopendra Graham, Eliza Munnice, Betty Munnice, and Lyneth Bejgal, the said black girl Luiza, I have give to Lyneth Bejgal, my afflicted daughter outd. I now order my black boy William to be sold and all my live stock and moveable property except what is named above to my beloved wife and money to be equally divided between my five above named daughters: as William is a faithful slave, my desire is that he may have liberty to chuse his master in the neighborhood not out of reach of his wife if such purchaser can be had to give his value.

I give and bequeath unto my son William Guthrie all my freehold possessions now intire, and likewise my black boy Joe by him paying one hundred dollars each to the children of my deceased son James G. Guthrie to be paid in rotation as the arrive to the age of twenty one years, beginning at Harney, then Hugh, then Elizabeth, then Luiza, then Margaret Jane, then Almira, then Stephen Rush; as for my son John I exclude I have give him his share of my estate here before.

I do appoint my son William Guthrie Executor of this my last will and testament. I also request the honorable Court of Pulaski may not require security of my Executor, in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal, this eighteenth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty six.
