Item. — It is my Will and desire that my Executor hereafter named
do as soon as convenient after my decease proceed to sell my Estate
on a credit of nine months, and out of the proceeds pay all my just
debts and then the Legacies hereafter named.

Item. — I give and bequeath to my daughter Frances Yates
(wife of Samuel Yates) one half of my Estate to her and her
Heirs forever.

Item. — I give and bequeath to my second daughter Lucy Walters
the other half of my Estate to her and her Heirs forever.

Lately I do appoint Thomas Fletcher my Executor to this my last
Will and Testament In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my
hand and seal this 20th day of November 1832 Eighteen hundred
and thirty two.

This last Will and testament of Lucy Yates deceased, was this day exhibited to the Court, proved by the oath of Henry Speller one of the subscribing Witnesses thereto, and Ordered to be certified. — And at a Court held for said County the 5th day of August 1833 This said last Will and testament was again exhibited to the Court, and freely proved by the oath of Ant. S. Hughes, and John Fletcher the other subscribing witnesses thereto and Ordered to be recorded. — And Thomas Fletcher the Executor therein named personally appeared in open Court and refused to take upon himself the Burthen of the execution thereof. — And on the motion of said Yates, who made oath according to law, and together with said Yates his account entered into and acknowledged a Bond in the penalty of Six Hundred Dollars conditioned according to law, and a writ is granted to the said Yates for obtaining letters of administration on the Estate of the said Lucy Yates deceased with her will annexed as in and to the form.
