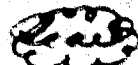


of one Lord, One thousand eight hundred and thirty five.

final term of this life, and it is appointed to all men
once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and
testament, that is to say; principally and first of all I
recommend my soul into the hands of almighty God who
gave it me and the disposal of my body I leave to the entire
discretion of my friends.

With respect to my worldly estate I give and bequeath to and
dispose of it in manner and proportions following.
That is to say first pay all my just debts, and the balance I
will and bequeath to my Brother Samuel Dodson the following
• Negroes Jesse, and Sarah, Sincere and James during his
natural life, and then to his wife (all after my death) also
my money and debts &c. and I myself are to be taken care
of during my natural life, should I not be able to take of
myself. and I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke and disannul
all and every other former testament, wills, bequests bequests
and Executors by me in any way way before made written
and bequeathed ratifying and confirming this and no other to be
my last will and testament — In Witness whereof I have hereunto
set my hand and seal the day and year above written.

This last will and testament of William Jackson deceased was
this day exhibited to the Court, signed by the said John Hamrick
