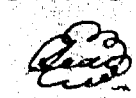


Mozingo In the name of God, Amen, I George Mozingo reflecting

constitute the following as my last will and testament
hereby revoking all wills here to fore made.

My will and desire is that the piece of Land upon which
I live containing about thirty five acres be sold by my Execu-
tor and out of the proceeds thereof my funeral expenses, &
all my just debts be paid, and the balance if any, I give
to my daughter Ann George I will to Jane Tobin two feather
beds and furniture, one hog, together with all my household
and kitchen furniture, provided she remain with me, and
keeps my house and cooks and washes for me until my
death, and in the event of her leaving me before my death
my will and desire is that the legacy hereby given her, go to
whosoever is my housekeeper at the time of my death.

Lastly I appoint my friend George Franklin my Executor to this
my last will and testament. In testimony whereof

In Rappahannock County Court 8th of July 1844

This writing purporting to be the last will and testament of George Moeings deceased dated the 22nd day of June 1842 was produced by Jno. Martin who intermarried with Phoebe Moeings the daughter of the said decedent in order to be proved.

And William Moeings the son of the said decedent appeared and approved the proof of the said will. Whereupon diverse witnesses were sworn and examined, and the parties after
