Duncan County, Virginia Will B. B. 1842-1849 (Wills and Estates)

and quite infirm, and even to my body and feeling that a dissolution of
soul and body must shortly occur, but being rational and sound in
mind, make this my last will and testament.
I first commend my Soul to the mercy of God, and my body to a decent
interment near the grave of my departed husband and all necessary
and suitable funeral expenses paid.
Secondly I wish all my just and legal debts paid as soon as practica-
ble after my departure.
Thirdly for the maintenance of children which I maintain and pay for my two
daughters Catharine Browning and Mary Browning and for the kindness &
love they have ever extended and shown me both in health and afflic-
tion, I give and bequeath to each of them one hundred dollars.
Fourthly I leave all the property which I hold in absolute right to be
sold to the highest bidder in the ordinary manner and the most prudent
after paying my necessary charges and costs and after complying with the
third clause in this will to the ordinary trustees between my two daugh-
ters Catharine Browning, Mary Browning, Fiddistye Duncan, James W.
Duncan, Berry A. Duncan, William D. Duncan, John A. Duncan.
Fifthly before the fourth clause is completed with, I bequeath to my husband

daughter Mary Janet Duncan in test and presence of witnesses and of
witnesses Benjamin H. Duncan & Jas. Browning my Executors to
carry the above execution.
