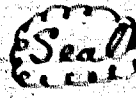

Will.
In the name of God, Amen, I Berrymans Hughes of the County of
Rappahannock and State of Virginia, being of sound mind and
disposing memory do declare this to be my last will and
testament hereby revoking all others.
First; I wish my executor hereinafter named, to pay my funeral
expenses together with all my just debts out of such property as
he may select.
Secondly; I give to Tho^s. Hughes Junr. in trust for the benefit of
my niece, Henrietta Moore a negro woman (Cinderella) and her
increase during her life and after her death to her bodily heirs.
Thirdly; I give to Tho^s. Hughes Junr. in trust for the benefit of
my niece Lucy Leantis a negro girl Delia and her increase, during
her life and after her death to her bodily heirs.
Fourthly; I give to Tho^s. Hughes Junr. in trust for the benefit
of my niece Mary Calvert a negro woman Betty and her increase,
during her life and after her death to her bodily heirs.
Fifthly; I give to my niece Rachel Hughes a negro girl Eliza,
to have, hold and dispose of as she may think proper.
Sixthly; I give to my nephew Tho^s. Hughes, after the payment of
all my just debts, the residue of my property, both personal
and real, to have, hold and dispose of as he may think proper.
Seventhly; I particularly request of my nephew Tho^s. Hughes that
he take good care of my old negroes.
Eighthly, and lastly; I do hereby constitute and appoint my
friend Lehas. Green (without security) my executor. As witness
my hand and seal this 6th day August eighteen hundred and

Court do hereby certify.

made, oath thereto and entered into a bond in the penalty of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) conditioned as the law directs without security, the testator having directed in his said will that his executor therein named should not be required to give security, and he having left visible estate sufficient to pay his debts, certificate is granted him for obtaining a probate of the said will in due form.
