ner and form following, that is to say:

1st. I desire that all of the perishable part of my estate be
immediately sold after my decease and out of the monies
arising therefrom all my just debts and funeral expenses be
paid; should the perishable part of my property prove insuffi-
cient for the above purposes, then I desire that my executor, here-
after named, may sell a sufficient portion of my land now
lying in the County and State aforesaid and the monies arising
therefrom shall be appropriated to the payment of my just
debts such as remain unpaid out of the sales of the
perishable part of my estate.

2dly. After the payment of my debts and funeral expenses, I
will and bequeath to my wife Ann Corbin all of my estate, both
personal and real for and during the term of her natural
life and after her decease I give the same to my children to
be equally divided among them and to be enjoyed by them forever.
And lastly, I do hereby constitute and appoint my son James
William Corbin as executor of this my last will and testament.
In witness whereof I have this eleventh day of April in the
year of our Lord eighteen hundred and fifty three, set my hand
and affixed my seal in the presence of the witnesses below men-
tioned.

and testament of William Corbin deceased, was this day pre-
sented to the Court, proved by the oath of William H. Miller
one of the subscribing witnesses thereto, and who also proved that
James H. Taylor the other subscribing witness thereto, subscribed the
same. At the same time as a witness that he subscribed it, and
that the said will was subscribed by them in the presence
of the Court and ordered to be recorded. And on the motion

with which and together with Amos & John, William J. Dudley and William H. Miller his associates (who justified on oath as to their sufficiency) entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000.00) conditioned as the law directs certificate is granted him for obtaining a probat of the said will in due form.

In the name of God, amen, I, John Amis of the County of Rappahannock and State of Virginia, being weak in body, but of sound and perfect mind and memory, blessed be Almighty God for the same, do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following, that is to say:
First, I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Lavina Amis the sum of two hundred dollars, the slaves Horace, Reuben, Oscar, Cassaann and Sarah Ann, the tract of land on which I reside containing about one hundred acres, also the two lots of woodland, one of about thirty one and $\frac{1}{4}$ acres and the other 20 acres, adjoining the lands of Dr. P. B. Bowen, Jas. Amis and others, also two McCormick's ploughs, 2 Shovel Dr., 2 Side-wipers, one large two horse harrow, 2 Sleighs and cradles, 2 mowing scythes, 2 grubbing hoes, my best wagon, spreaders and singletrees, three
